## Kwame Ture (formerly Stokely Carmichael)

Kwame Ture, previously known as Stokely Carmichael, was a prominent and influential leader in the Black militancy movement in the United States during the 1960s. He served as the head of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC) and later as the prime minister of the Black Panther Party, where he famously coined the phrase "Black Power." In 1969, he disassociated himself from American groups over disagreements regarding alliances with White radicals and subsequently relocated to Guinea, declaring himself a pan-Africanist. In 1978, he adopted the name Kwame Ture to honor African socialist leaders Kwame Nkrumah and Ahmed Sekou Toure. He resided in Guinea for 33 years until his diagnosis with prostate cancer, passing away in 1998.

## Charles V. Hamilton

Charles V. Hamilton is a distinguished political scientist, civil rights leader, and the W. S. Sayre Professor Emeritus of Government and Political Science at Columbia University. His academic and activist contributions have significantly shaped the discourse on race and politics in America.




Image: A graphic summarizing the book's core message: 'A radical blueprint for lasting social change that exposes systemic racism and champions Black unity and independence from the existing order.'
