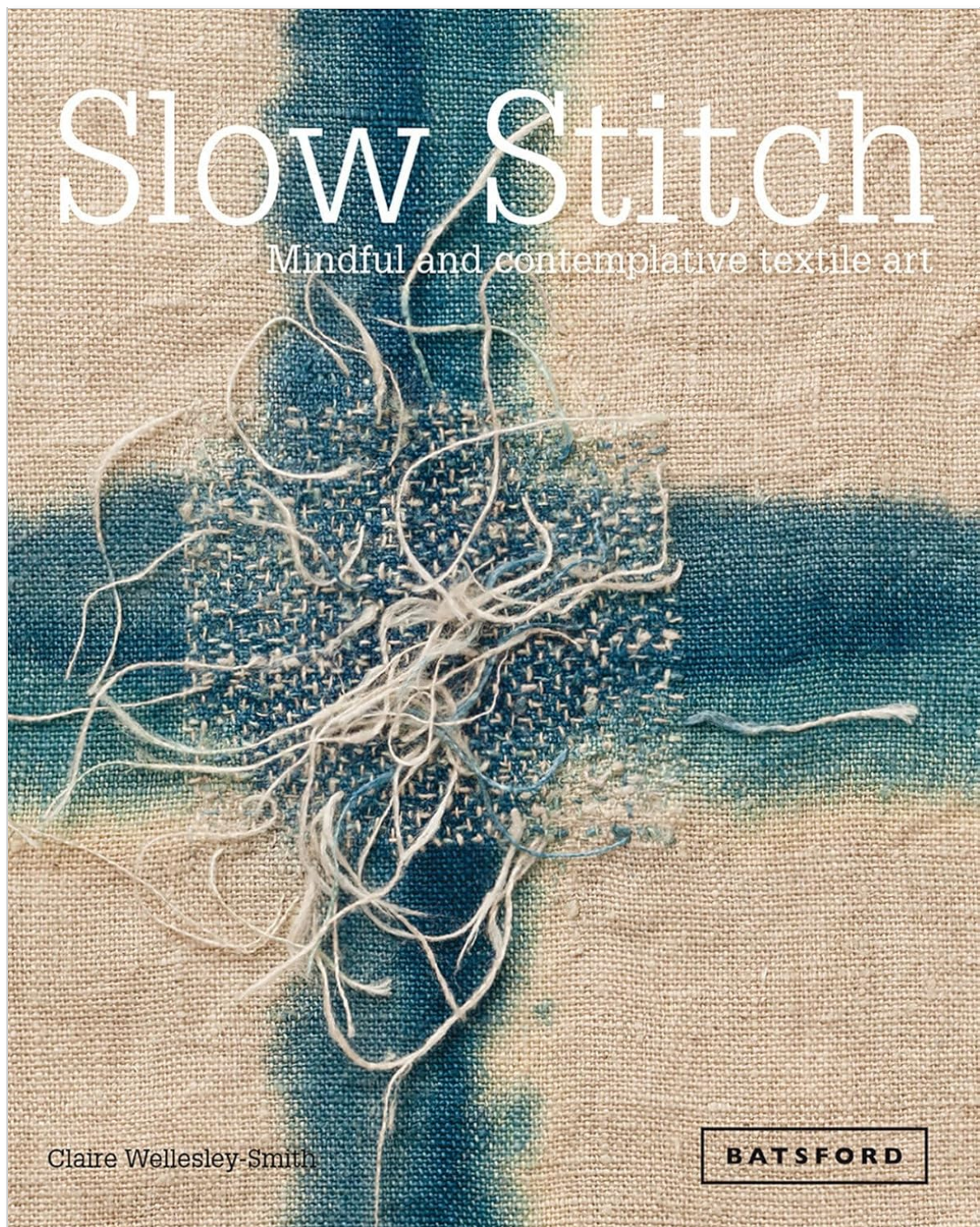


Image: The cover of "Slow Stitch: Mindful and Contemplative Textile Art", illustrating the book's focus on textured, hand-stitched textiles.
