INTRODUCTION

SETUP: PLANTING INSTRUCTIONS

Successful germination and growth begin with proper planting. Royal Azalea seeds require specific conditions to thrive.

Recommended Planting Period

- **Expected Planting Period:** Spring.

Seed Preparation and Sowing

1. **Stratification:** Royal Azalea seeds often benefit from a period of cold stratification to break dormancy. Place seeds in a moist medium (like peat moss or sand) in a sealed bag and refrigerate for 60-90 days before planting.

5. **Temperature:** Maintain a consistent temperature between 65-75°F (18-24°C) for optimal germination.

OPERATING: CARE INSTRUCTIONS

Once germinated, proper care is crucial for the healthy development of your Royal Azalea plants.

Light Requirements

- **Sunlight Exposure:** Partial Shade to Light Shade. While they can tolerate sun, protection from intense afternoon sun is beneficial, especially in warmer climates.
- **Indoor/Outdoor Usage:** Outdoor.

Watering and Soil

- **Product Care Instructions:** Water.

MAINTENANCE

Pruning

Fertilization

Winter Protection

- In colder zones (Zone 5), apply a layer of mulch around the base of the plant in late fall to protect roots from freezing temperatures.

TROUBLESHOOTING

Addressing common issues can help maintain the health and vitality of your Royal Azalea.

Poor Germination

- **Issue:** Seeds do not sprout or have a low germination rate.
- **Solution:** Ensure proper cold stratification was performed. Verify soil moisture and temperature are consistent. Azalea seeds are very small and can be challenging to germinate; patience is key.

Yellowing Leaves (Chlorosis)

- **Issue:** Leaves turn yellow, often with green veins.
- **Solution:** This often indicates a soil pH that is too high (alkaline) or a nutrient deficiency (e.g., iron). Test your soil pH and amend with sulfur or peat moss to lower it. Apply an iron supplement if necessary.

Lack of Blooms

- **Issue:** Plant grows but does not produce flowers.
- **Solution:** Ensure adequate sunlight (partial shade is ideal, too much deep shade can reduce flowering). Avoid late-season pruning, which removes flower buds. Ensure proper fertilization; too much nitrogen can promote foliage growth at the expense of flowers.
