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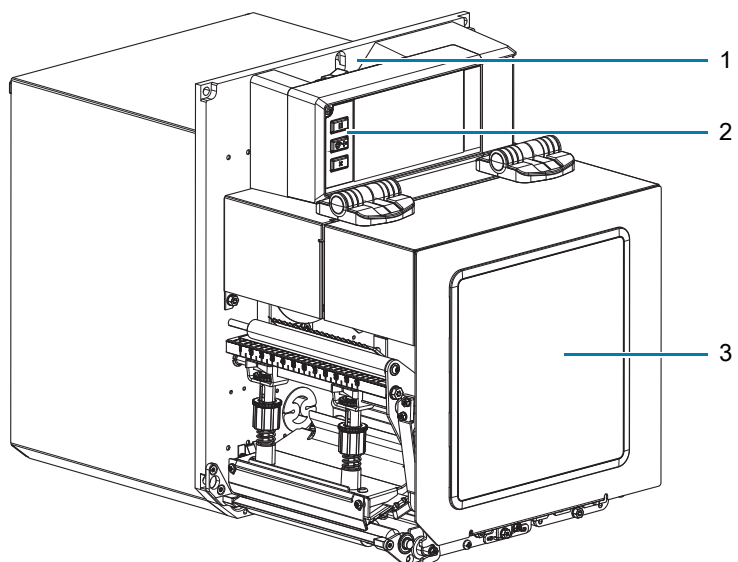
Introduction

This section provides a high-level overview of the printer and its components.

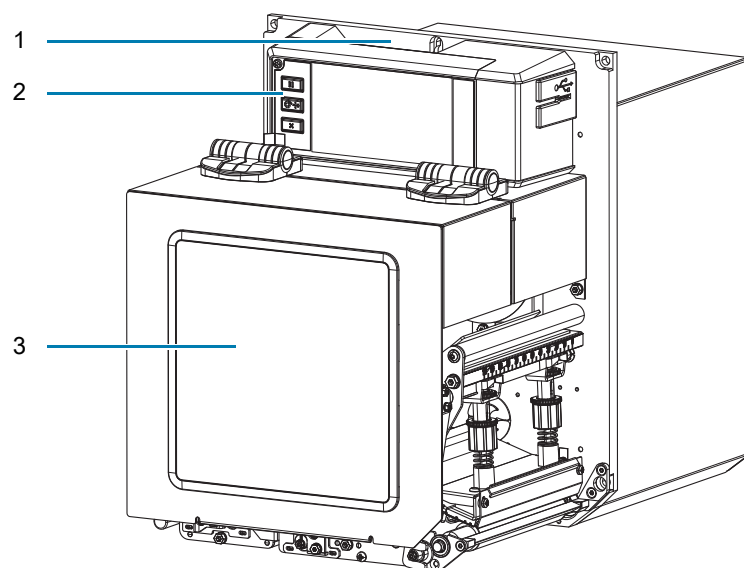
Print Engine Orientation

The ZE511 and ZE521 print engines are available in a left-hand configuration (the print mechanism is on the left) and a right-hand configuration (the print mechanism is on the right).

Left-hand (LH) print engine



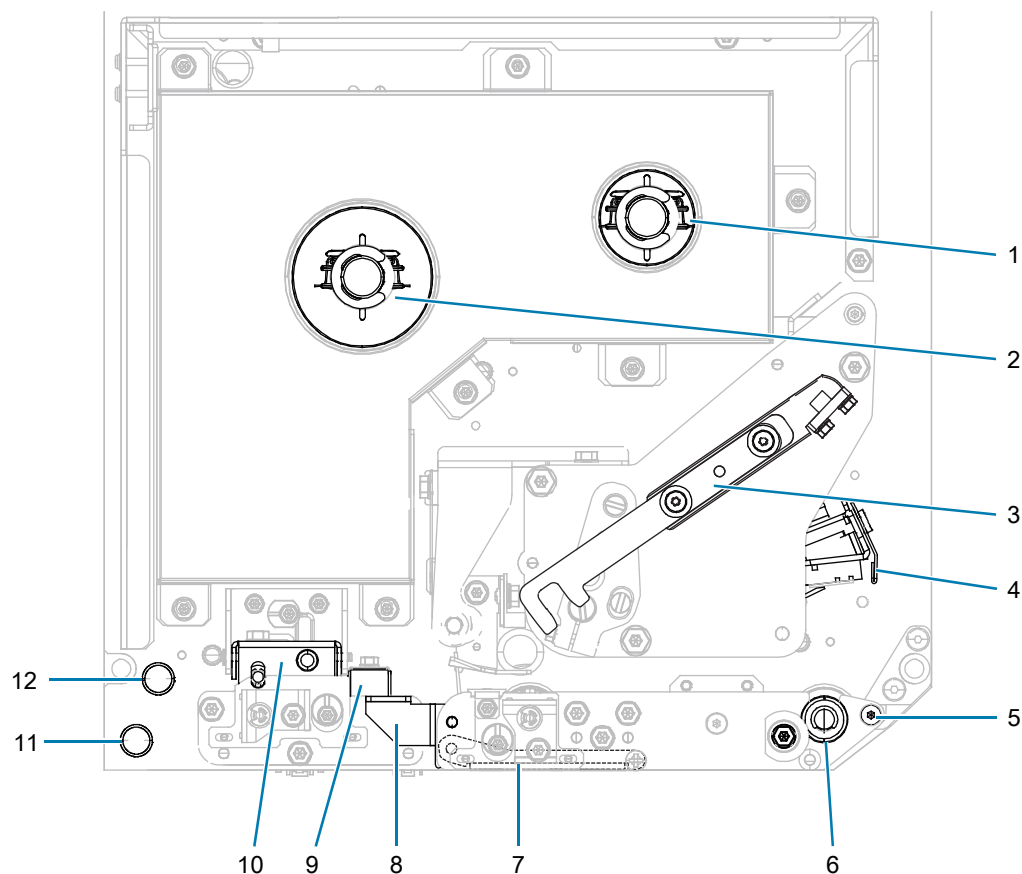
Right-hand (RH) print engine

Print Engine Components

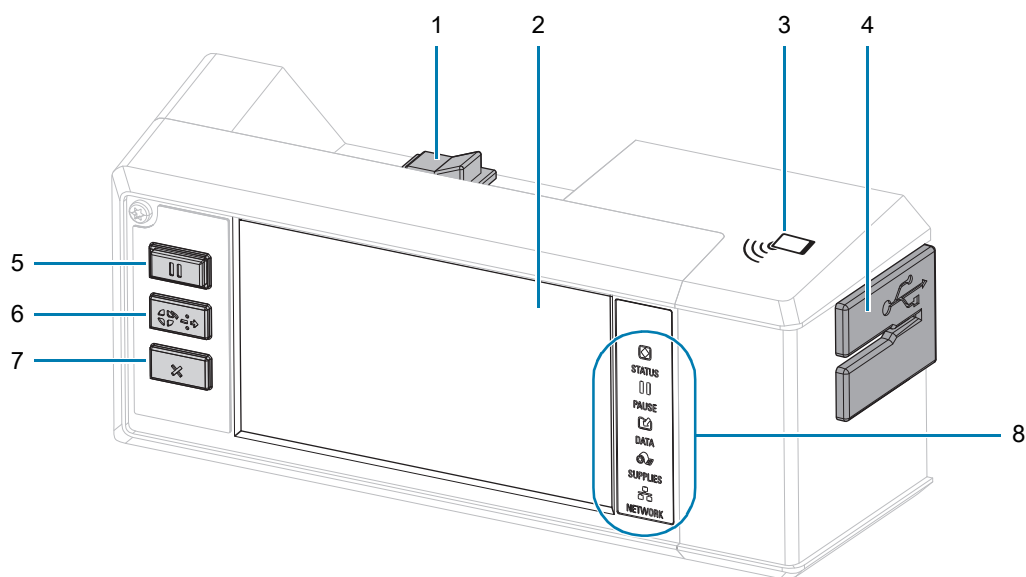

Control Panel

All controls and indicators for the print engine are located on the control panel.



1	Power switch	Toggles the print engine on/off.
2	Display	Shows the print engine's operating status and allows the user to navigate the menu system. For more information, see Home Screen on page 11 .
3	NFC logo	Used for the Print Touch feature. For more information, see Print Touch/Near Field Communication (NFC) on page 109 .
4	USB host ports	Allows you to connect USB devices such as memory sticks, keyboards, or handheld scanners to the printer. For more information, see USB Host Ports on page 109 .
5	PAUSE button	Starts or stops print engine operation when pressed.
6	FEED button	Forces the print engine to feed one blank label each time the button is pressed.
7	CANCEL button	Cancels print jobs when the print engine is paused.
8	Indicator lights	Communicate the printer's status. For more information, see Indicator Lights on page 93 .

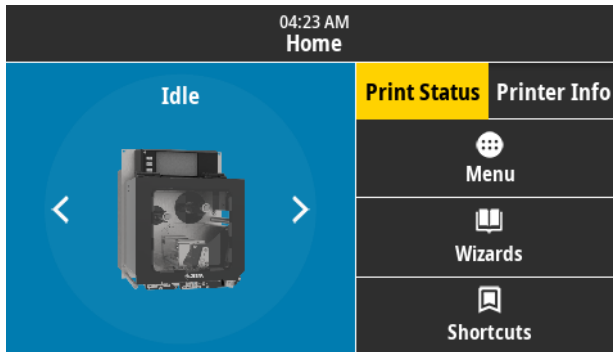
Home Screen



IMPORTANT: If the background color of the Home screen is yellow or red, the printer is in an alert or error state and may need user intervention. For more information, see [Alert and Error States on page 88](#).

Print Status Tab

The Print Status tab on the Home screen provides the current status (such as Idle). On this screen, touching the left or right arrow rotates the image of the printer so that you can view it from any angle.



NOTE: Depending on how your print engine is configured, the screens may display horizontally or vertically. See [System > Settings > Display Orientation on page 35](#) for options.

Printer Info Tab

The Printer Info tab on the Home screen provides connectivity and firmware data. To scroll in a screen that does not display everything at one time, such as the horizontal Printer Info screen, touch the screen and drag upward.

IMPORTANT: When using the Wizards, do not send data to the print engine from the host. For best results, use full-width media running the Print or Set All Wizards. If the media is shorter than an image to be printed, the image may be truncated or print across multiple labels.

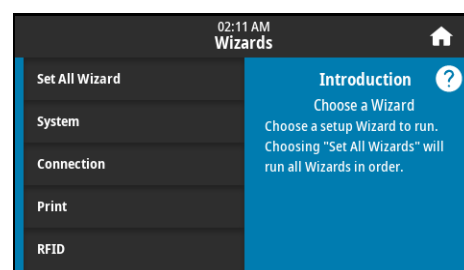
Set All Wizard—runs all of the Wizards in sequence.

System—sets up non-print related operating system settings.

Connection—configures the printer's connectivity options.

Print—configures key printing parameters and features. See [Running the Print Wizard and Printing a Test Label on page 27](#).

RFID—sets up the RFID subsystem operations.

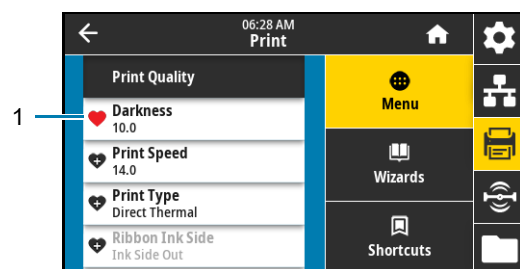


Shortcuts

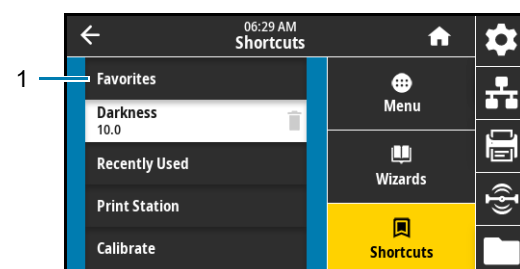
Allows you to quickly access the most recent menu items and to save your favorites. The Print Station and Calibrate menu items also appear in the shortcuts.

1. Touch the dark heart icon  next to a menu item to save it to your list of favorites.

A red heart icon (1) indicates a saved item.



2. Access saved items by touching **Favorites** (1).



Preparing to Print

Ordering Supplies and Accessories

The following required items do NOT come with the printer:

- Label design software
- Communication/network cables (such as USB, serial, parallel, wired Ethernet)
- Media
- Ribbon (if your printer has a thermal transfer option)

Label Design Software

Select and install the software that you will use to create label formats for your printer. One option is ZebraDesigner, which you can download from [zebra.com](https://www.zebra.com).

Media

For optimal printing quality and proper printer performance across our product line, Zebra strongly recommends the use of Zebra Certified Supplies as part of the total solution. A wide range of paper, polypropylene, polyester, and vinyl stock has been specifically engineered to enhance the printing capabilities of the print engine and to prevent premature printhead wear. To purchase supplies, go to [zebra.com/supplies](https://www.zebra.com/supplies).

The [Glossary on page 174](#) includes terms associated with media, such as black mark media, gap/notch media, RFID media, fanfold media, and roll media. Use these terms to help determine which type of media is best for your needs.

Ribbon

Do I need to use ribbon? The media itself determines if you need to use ribbon. Thermal Transfer media requires ribbon while Direct Thermal media does not.

How can I tell if media is Direct Thermal or Thermal Transfer? The easiest way is to scratch the surface of the media rapidly with your fingernail. If a black mark appears where you scratched, the media is Direct Thermal, and you do not need to use ribbon.

What kind of ribbon can I use? Ribbon can be wound with the coated side on the inside or outside. This print engine can use either type. Contact your authorized Zebra reseller for ordering information.

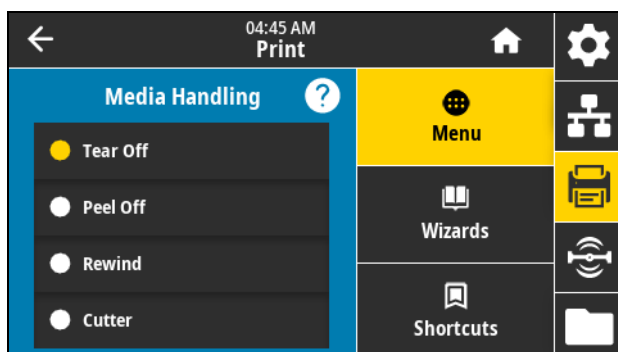


How can I tell which side of the ribbon is coated? Press a corner of the sticky side of a label to the outer surface of the roll of ribbon, and then peel the label off of the ribbon. If ink particles adhere to the label, the outer side of the roll is coated. Repeat this test with the inner surface if necessary to confirm the coated surface.

An alternate method is to unroll a short length of ribbon, place the outer surface against a piece of paper, and scratch the inner surface of the ribbon with your fingernail. Lift the ribbon and check for marks on the paper. If the ribbon left a mark, the outer side is coated.

Specifying the Media Handling Method

1. On the Home screen, touch **Menu > Print > Image Adjust > Media Handling**.



2. Select a media handling method that matches your media and setup.

Method	Description
Tear Off	The printer prints label formats as it receives them. The printer operator can tear off the printed labels when the printer stops.
Peel Off	The printer peels the label from the backing during printing and then pauses until the label is removed.
Rewind	The printer prints without pausing between labels. The media is wound onto a core after printing.
Cutter	The printer cuts between labels after each one is printed.
Delayed Cut	The printer waits for a delayed cut ZPL command (~JK) before it cuts the last printed label.
Linerless Peel	Not used. Reserved for future use.
Linerless Rewind	
Linerless Tear	
Applicator	The printer prints when it receives a signal from the applicator. Refer to the Advanced User Information section of the Maintenance Manual for additional information about the applicator interface.
Linerless Cut	Not used. Reserved for future use.
Linerless Delayed Cut	
Stream	The printer prints a batch of labels with backfeed occurring only at the start and end of the batch instead of between individual labels. This setting increases label throughput in batch printing.

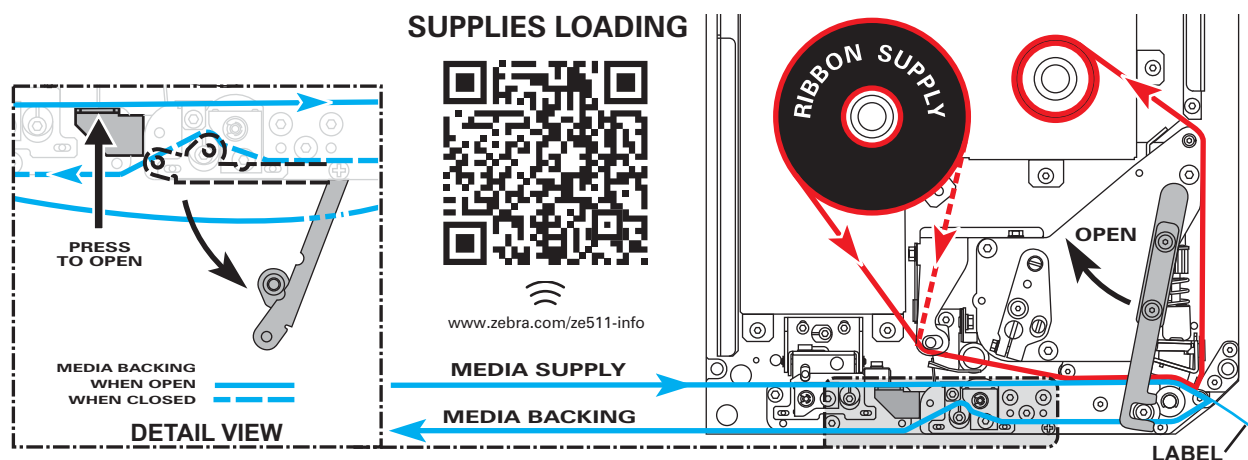
3. Touch the home icon  to return to the Home screen.

Ribbon and Media Loading

Use the instructions in this section to load ribbon (if used) and media in a ZE5111/ZE521 print engine.



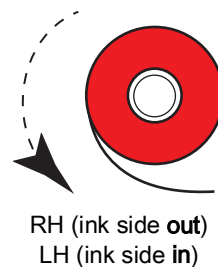
NOTE: The majority of the graphics in this section show a right-hand (RH) unit with ribbon that is coated with ink on the outside. Graphics for other options are included in some places for clarity.



Loading Ribbon

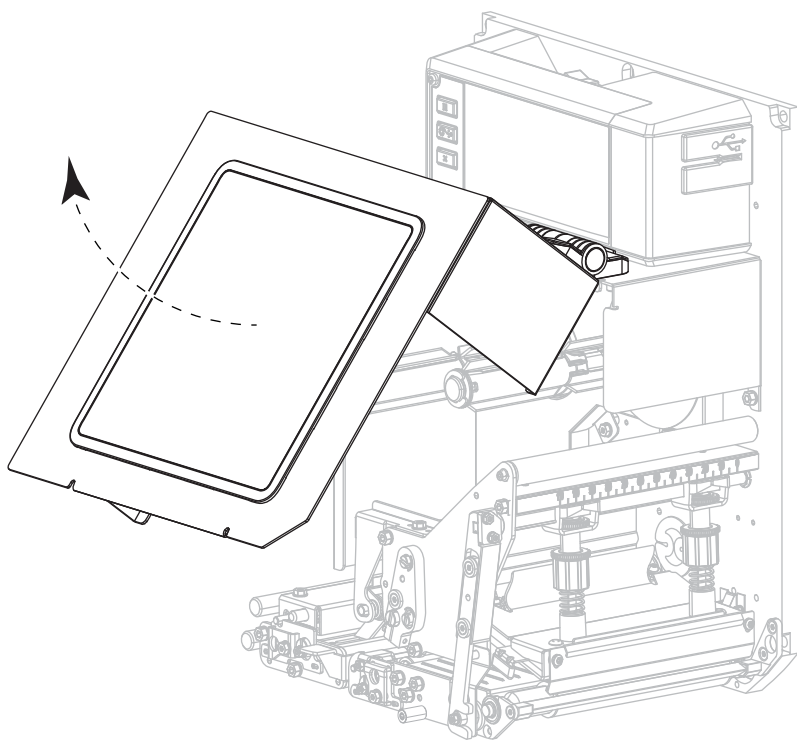
Ribbon is used with thermal transfer labels. For direct thermal labels, do not load ribbon in the print engine. To determine if ribbon must be used with a particular media, see [Do I need to use ribbon? on page 13](#). To order Zebra Certified ribbon or media, visit zebra.com/supplies.

1. Determine which side of the ribbon is coated with ink (see [How can I tell which side of the ribbon is coated? on page 13](#)), and then position the ribbon roll with the loose end unrolling in the direction shown.

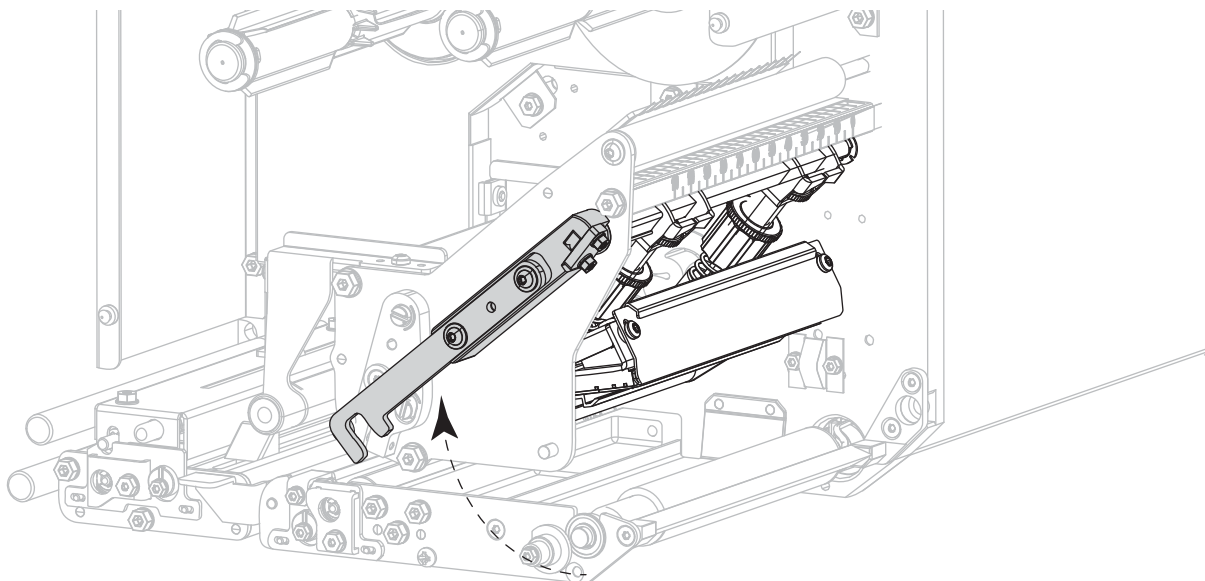


2. If necessary, update the ribbon ink side setting (see [Print > Print Quality > Ribbon Tension on page 51](#)).

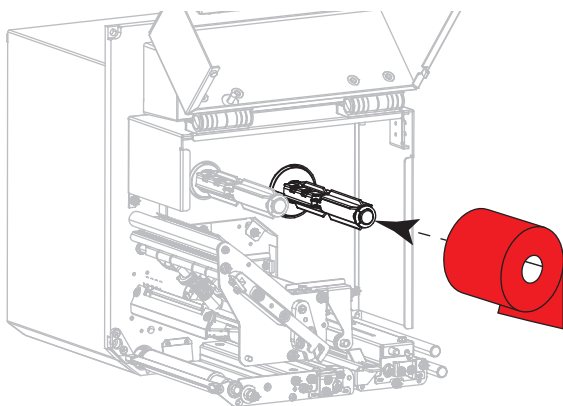
3. Open the media cover.



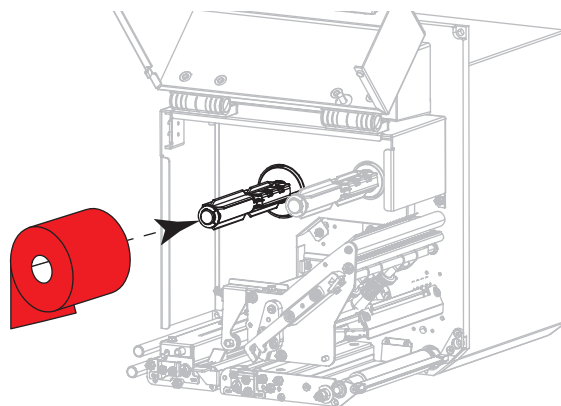
4. Release the printhead assembly.



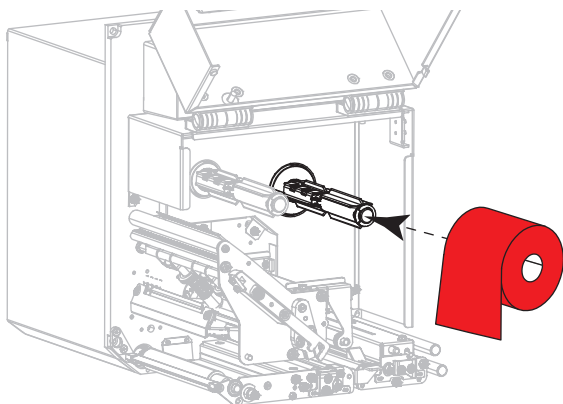
5. Place the roll of ribbon on the ribbon supply spindle. Push the roll back as far as it will go.



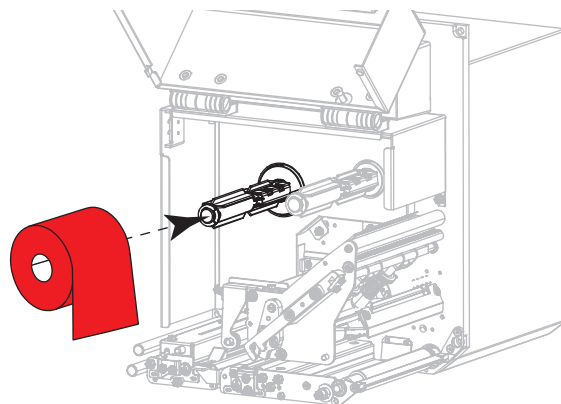

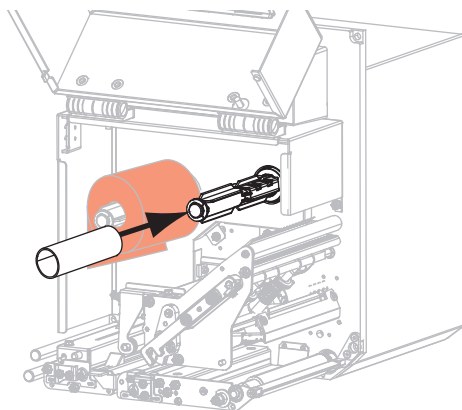

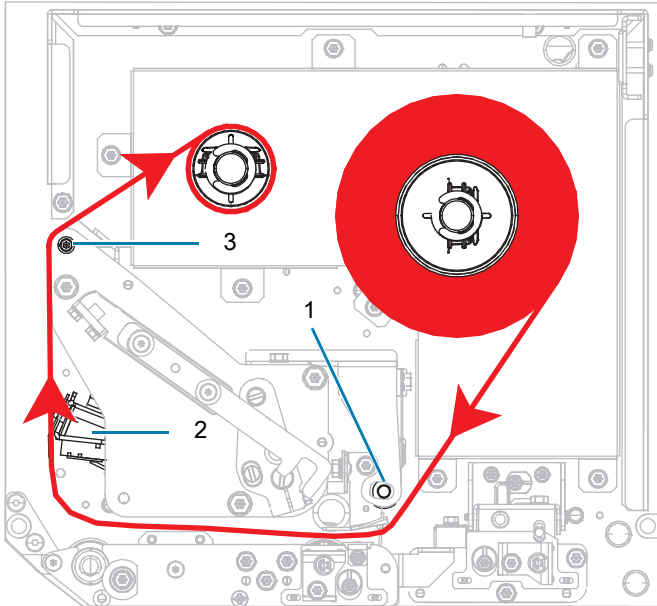
6. Place an empty ribbon core on the ribbon take-up spindle. Push the core back as far as it will go.



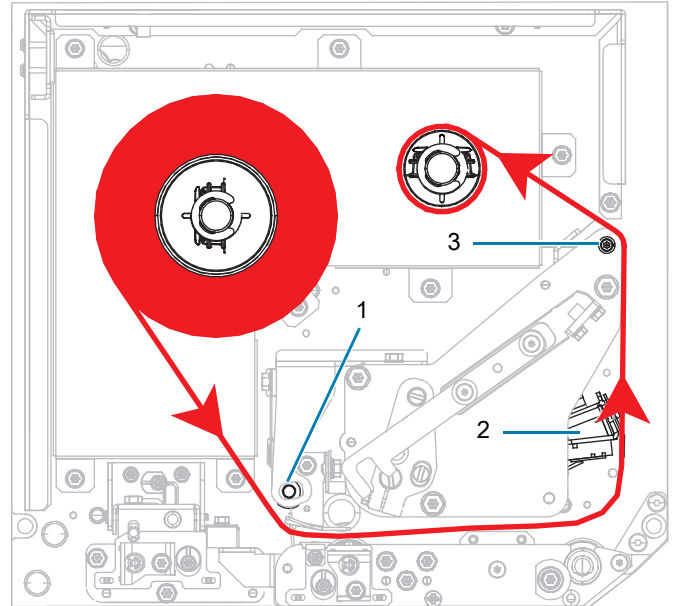


CAUTION—HOT SURFACE: The printhead may be hot and could cause severe burns. Allow the printhead to cool.

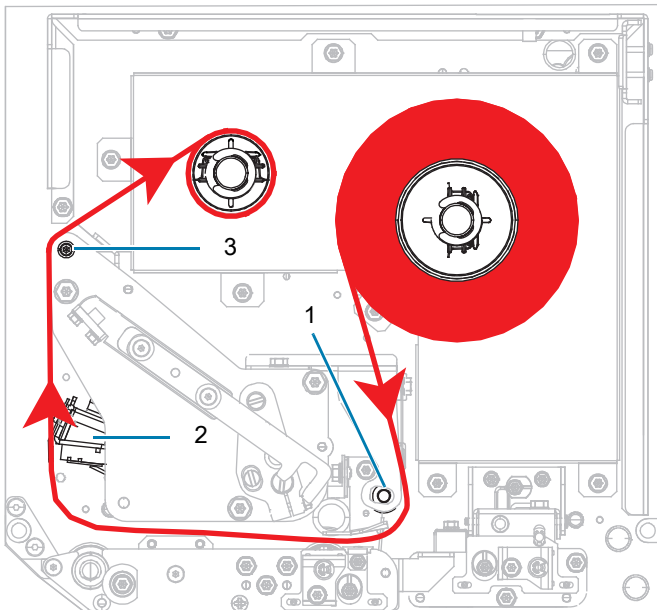
7. Thread the ribbon under the lower ribbon guide roller (1), under the printhead assembly (2), and then over the upper ribbon guide roller (3).



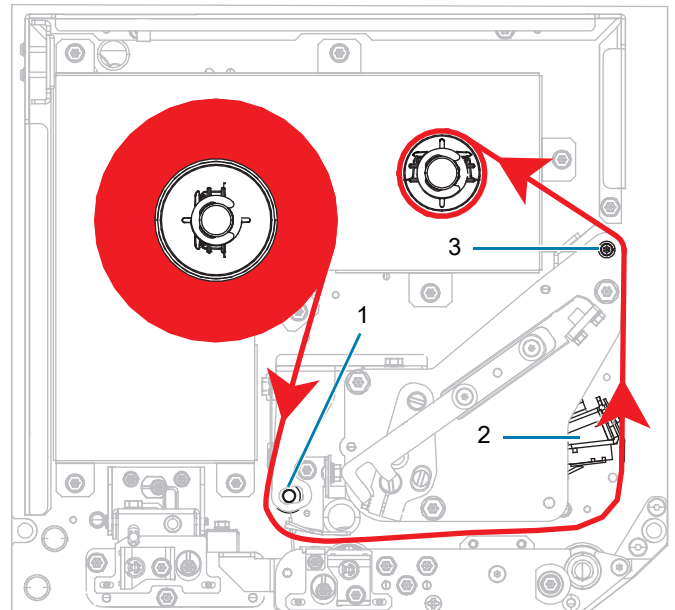

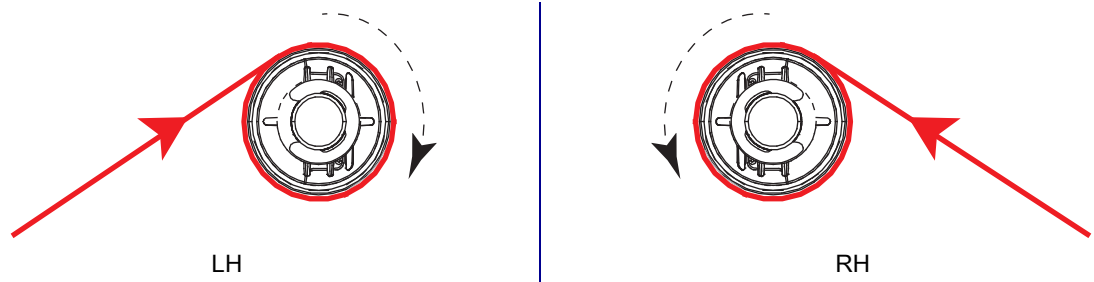

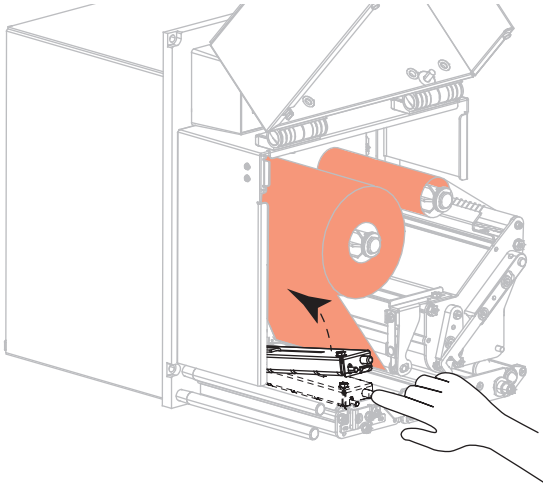

8. Wind the ribbon around the core on the ribbon take-up spindle in the direction shown.

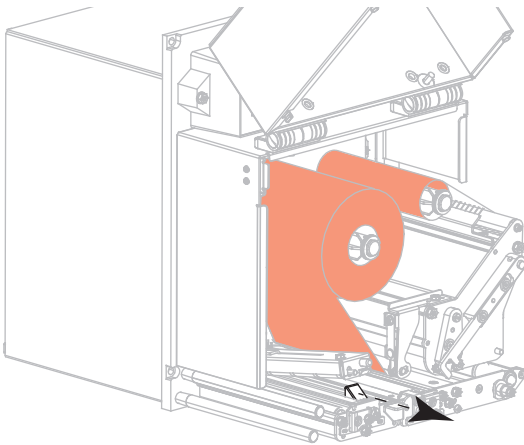


Loading Media

1. Load media on the media supply reel of the applicator (refer to the applicator's documentation for more information).
2. Press the release button on the pinch roller assembly. Allow the assembly to pivot upward.

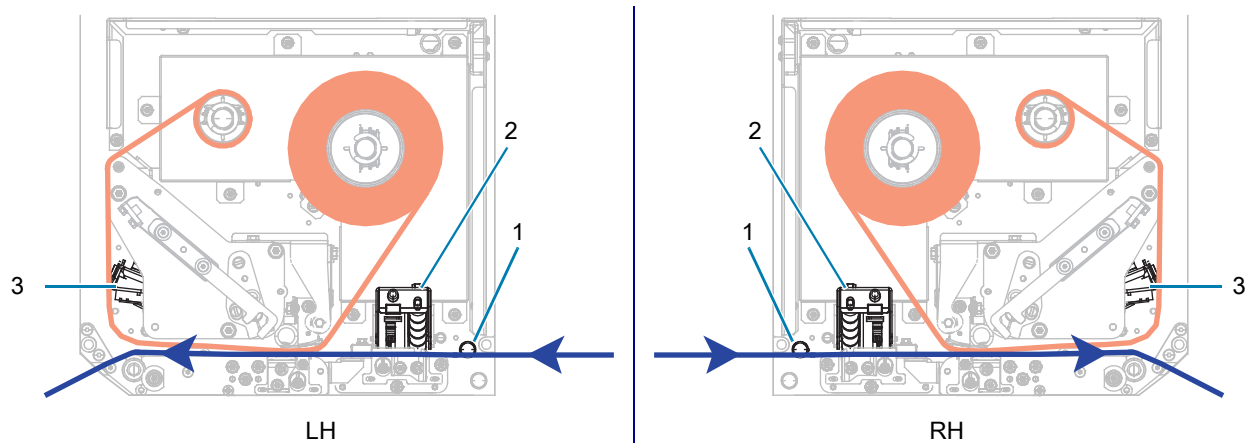


3. Slide the media guide all the way out.

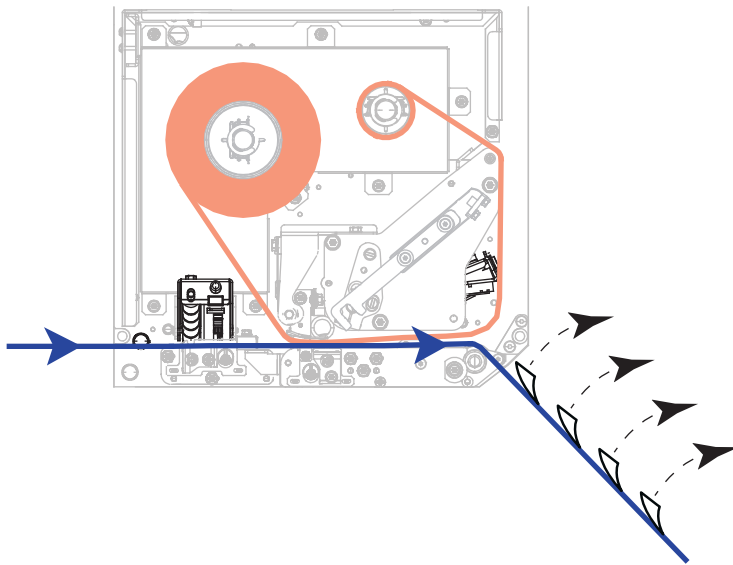


Preparing to Print

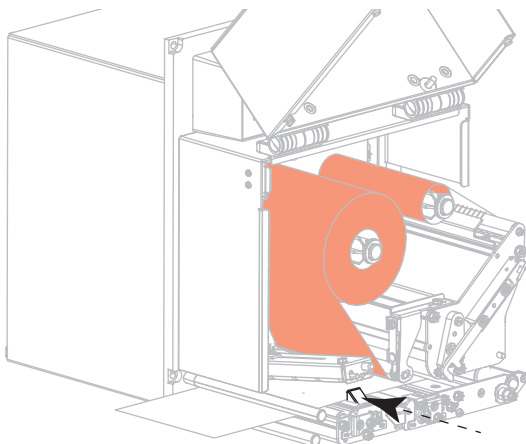
4. Thread the media under the upper guide post (1), below the pinch roller assembly (2), and under the printhead assembly (3).



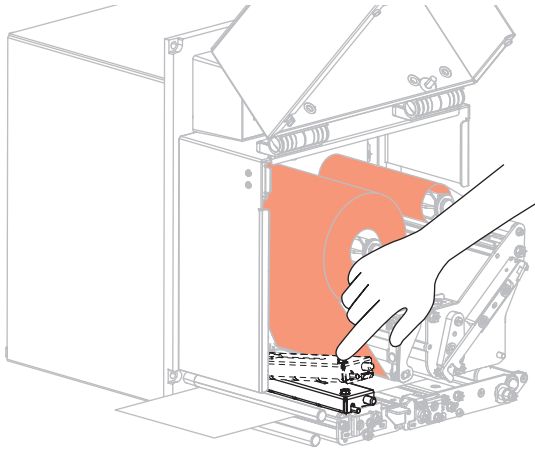
5. Extend approximately 30 in. (75 cm) of media past the peel bar. Remove and discard the labels from the liner on this exposed media.



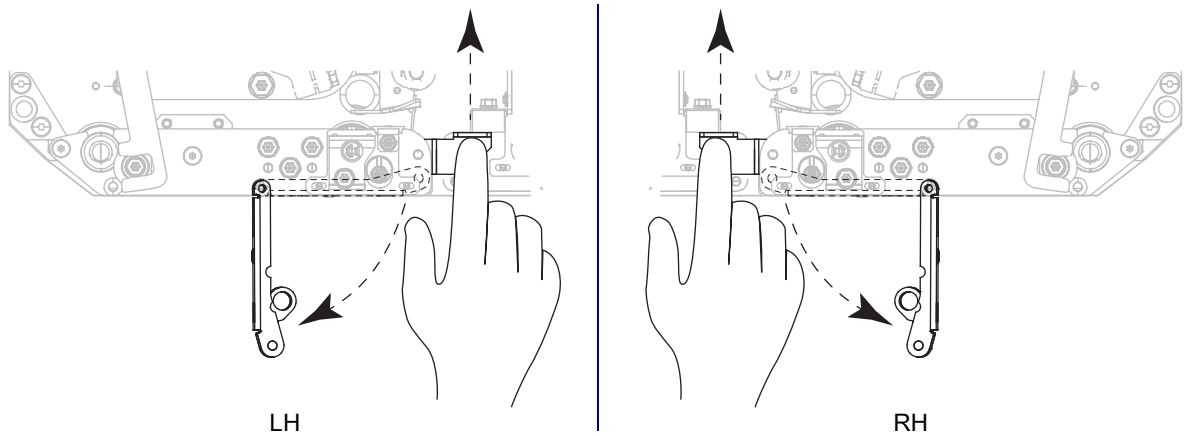
6. Slide in the media guide until it just touches the edge of the media.



7. Press down on the pinch roller assembly until it locks closed.



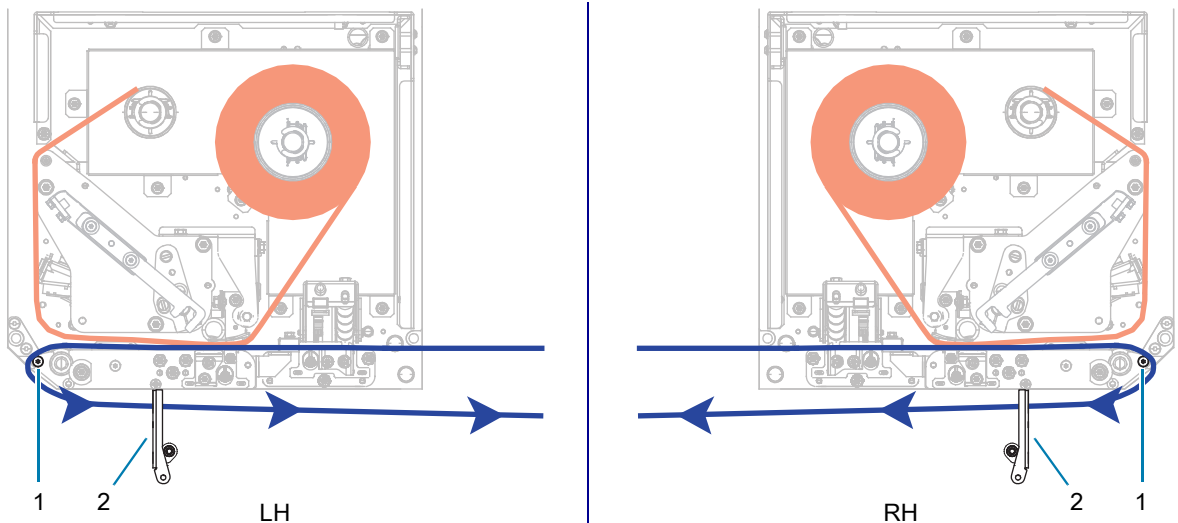
8. Raise the peel roller latch so that the peel roller assembly pivots downward.



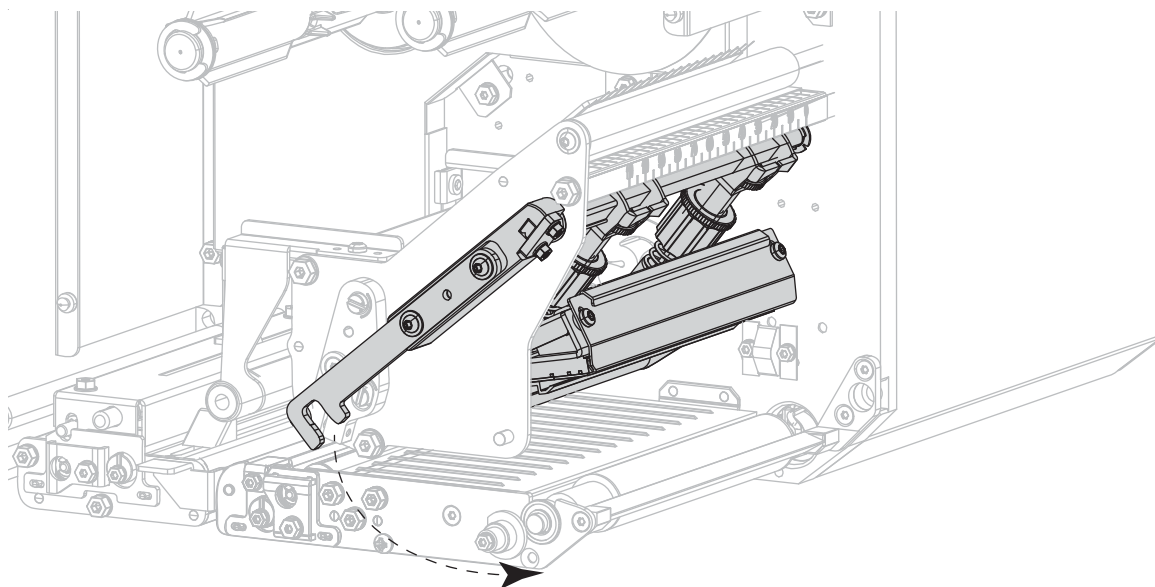
9. Thread the liner around the peel bar (1) and through the peel roller assembly (2).



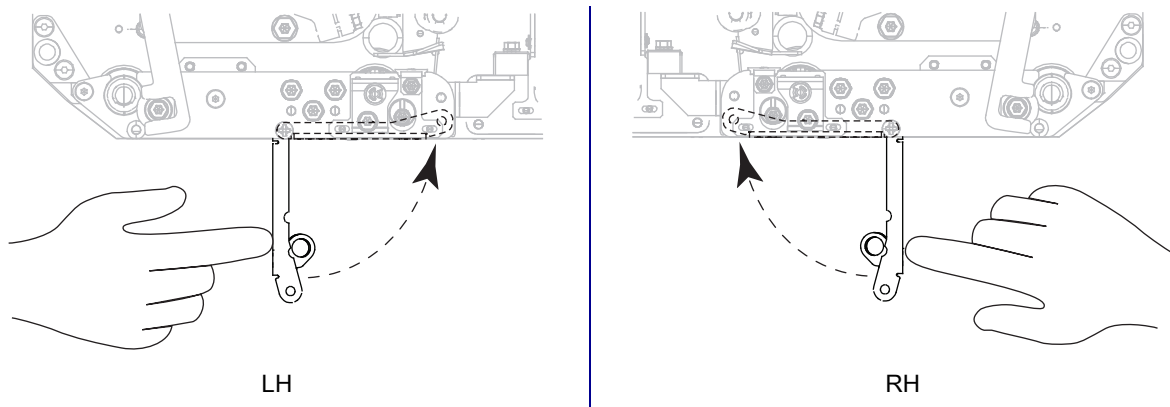
IMPORTANT: If the applicator has an air tube, route the liner between the air tube and the peel bar. Do not thread the liner over the air tube.



10. Lock the printhead assembly.

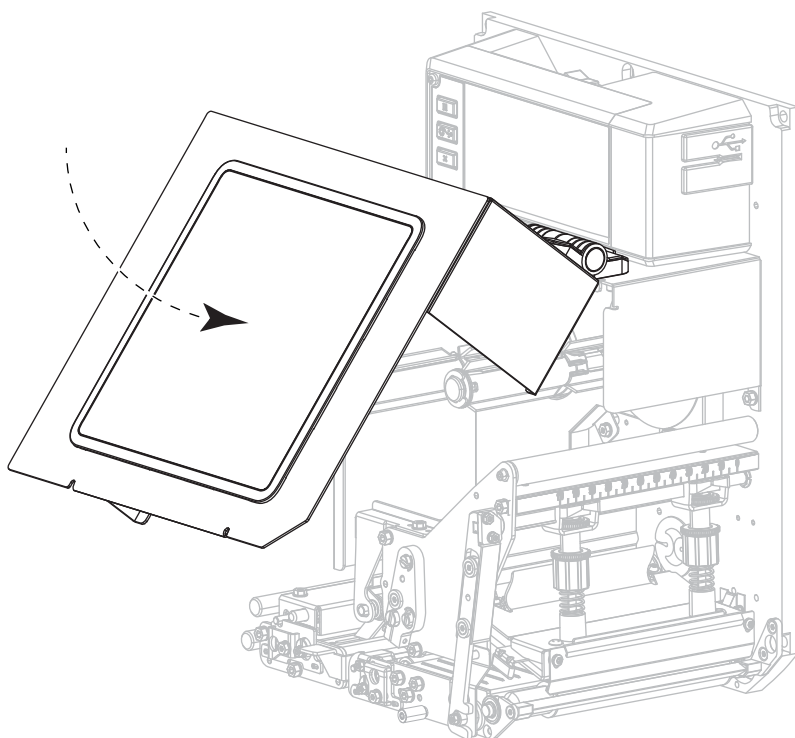


11. Rotate the peel roller assembly up until it locks into the closed position.



12. Thread the liner around the take-up spindle of the applicator (refer to the applicator's documentation for more information).

13. Close the media cover.



14. If desired, perform the [PAUSE Self-Test on page 83](#) to verify that your printer is able to print.

Calibrating the Ribbon and Media Sensors

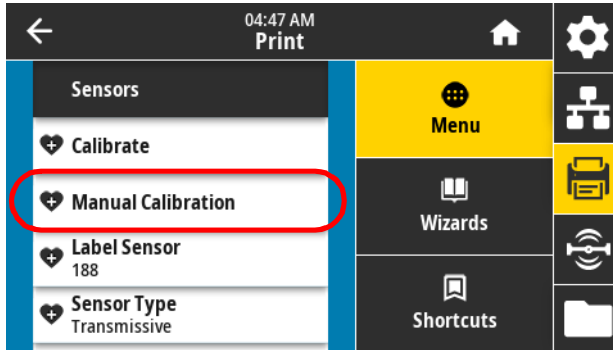
Use the procedure in this section to calibrate the printer, which adjusts the sensitivity of the media and ribbon sensors.



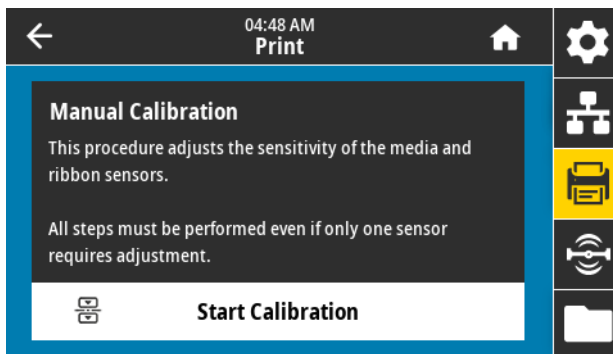
IMPORTANT: Follow the calibration procedure exactly as presented.

To cancel the calibration process, press and hold **CANCEL** at any step in the procedure.

1. Touch **Print > Sensors > Manual Calibration**.



The printer prompts you to start calibration.



2. Touch **Start Calibration**.
3. Follow the steps in the calibration procedure.
4. When calibration is complete, press **PAUSE** to exit pause mode and enable printing.

Running the Print Wizard and Printing a Test Label

The Print Wizard configures the printer, prints test labels, and adjusts print quality based on the results of the test labels.



IMPORTANT: When using the Wizards, do not send data to the printer from the host.

For best results, use full-width media running the **Print Wizard** or **Set All Wizard**. If the media is smaller than an image to be printed, the results may be truncated or print across multiple labels.

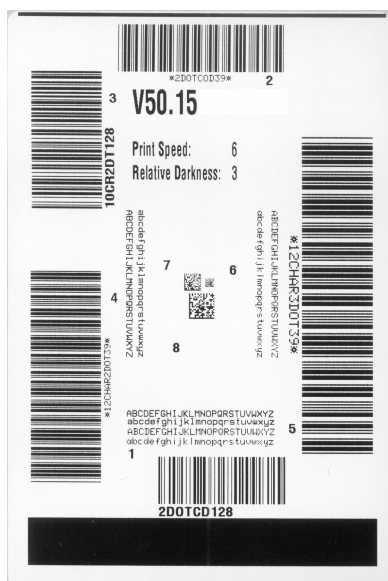
After you have completed the printer setup procedures and run the printer setup wizard, use this section to print a test label. Printing this label allows you to see if your connection is working and if you need to adjust any of the print settings.

1. On the Home screen, touch **Wizards > Print > Start Print**.
2. Follow the prompts to specify the following information:
 - print type (Thermal Transfer or Direct Thermal)
 - media type (Continuous, Gap/Notch, or Mark)
 - label width
 - media handling method (tear off, peel-off, rewind, cutter, delayed cut, linerless peel, linerless rewind, linerless tear, or applicator)

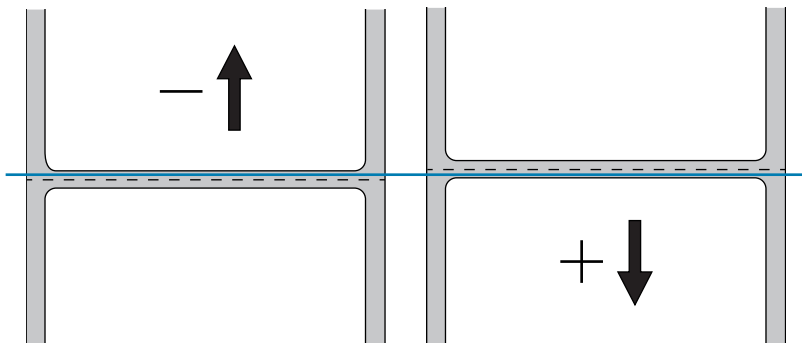
After you have specified these, the wizard instructs you to load media and then to place a label over the media sensor.

3. If you have not already done so, load media, and then touch the check mark.
4. At the prompt, close the printhead, and then touch the next check mark.
The printer calibrates and then asks if you would like to print a test label.
5. Follow the prompts until the printer completes auto calibration.
6. When asked to print a test label, touch the check mark.

A test label similar to this one prints. If your labels are smaller than the image, only a portion of the test label prints.



7. Examine the position of the label over the tear bar. If necessary, shift the position of the media over the tear-off bar after printing.
 - If the space between labels falls on the tear bar, continue with the next step.
 - If the space between labels does not fall directly on the tear bar, shift the position of the media over the tear bar after printing. Lower numbers move the media into the printer by the specified number of dots (the tear line moves closer to the edge of the label just printed). Higher numbers move the media out of the printer (the tear line moves closer to the leading edge of the next label).



8. Examine the quality of the image on the test label. Is the quality of the barcode and text on the test label acceptable? See [Judging Barcode Quality on page 80](#) for assistance.
 - If yes, touch the check mark, and then continue with [step 13](#).
 - If no, adjust the print quality manually by changing darkness and speed settings through the printer's menu system, or continue with this procedure to run the Print Quality Assistance wizard.

Print Quality Assistance Wizard

9. Touch **Print Quality Assistance**.

The printer prompts for the number of test labels to print. The more labels you choose to print, the more choices that you will have available to decide on label quality. In general, if your test label from the previous wizard was acceptable, a lower number of test labels in this step will probably suffice.

10. Select a number of test labels to print.

The printer prints the specified number of test labels and prompts you for the best test label.

11. Decide which test label is the best quality. See [Judging Barcode Quality on page 80](#) for assistance. If none of the labels are acceptable, use the arrow to back up a screen in the wizard, and select a larger number of test labels.
12. In the list on the display, select the identifier for the test label with the best quality, and then touch the check mark.

The printer changes the darkness and speed to the levels used on the best test label.
13. If necessary, see [Printing or Print Quality Issues on page 96](#) to see what other issues may be affecting your print quality.

The print setup procedure is complete.

Zebra Basic Interpreter (ZBI 2.0™) is a programming option that may be installed on your printer. If you would like to acquire this option, contact your Zebra reseller for more information.

If ZBI programs have been downloaded to your printer, you may select one to run using this menu item. If no program exists on your printer, **NONE** is listed.

When ZBI programs have been downloaded but none are running, the printer lists all available programs. To run one of them, touch **Run** (highlighted in white) under the program name.

After a program is running, only that program is listed. Touch **Stop** (highlighted in white) to end the program.



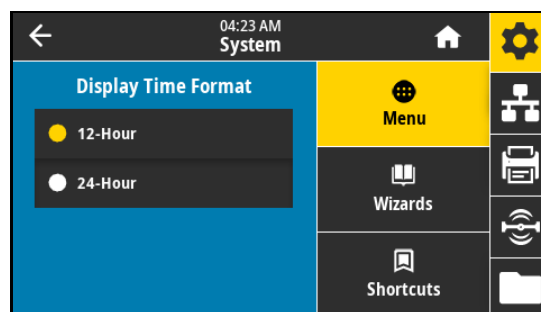

System > Settings > Restore Defaults

Restore specific printer, print server, and network settings back to the factory defaults. Use care when loading defaults because you will need to reload all settings that you changed manually.

Accepted values:

- **PRINTER**—Restores all printer settings other than the network settings back to the factory defaults.
- **NETWORK**—Reinitializes the printer's wired or wireless print server. With a wireless print server, the printer also reassociates with your wireless network.
- **LAST SAVED**—Loads settings from the last permanent save.

Toggle Positioning and Printhead Pressure Adjustment

The printhead pressure toggles can be adjusted to create more or less pressure, as needed. They can also be moved from side to side to adjust the pressure in certain areas.

If the toggles are not positioned correctly or adjusted to apply the correct pressure, the following types of issues may result:

- media and ribbon may slip
- ribbon may wrinkle
- media may move from side to side during printing
- printing may be too light or too dark on one side of the media

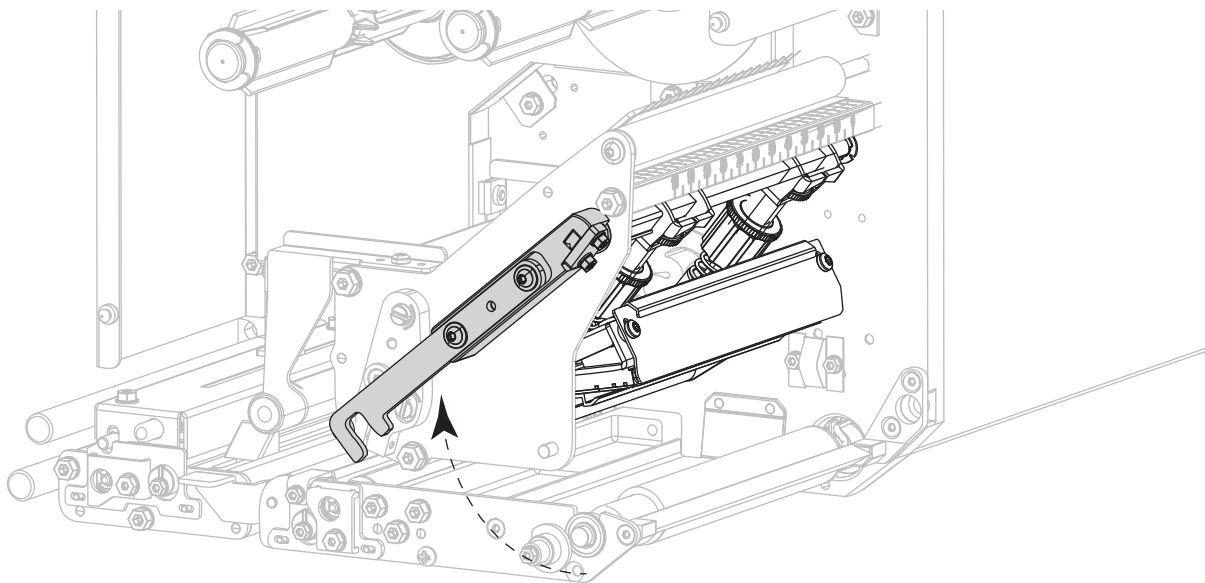
Use the lowest printhead pressure necessary to produce good print quality. Higher pressures may cause premature wear on the printhead elements.

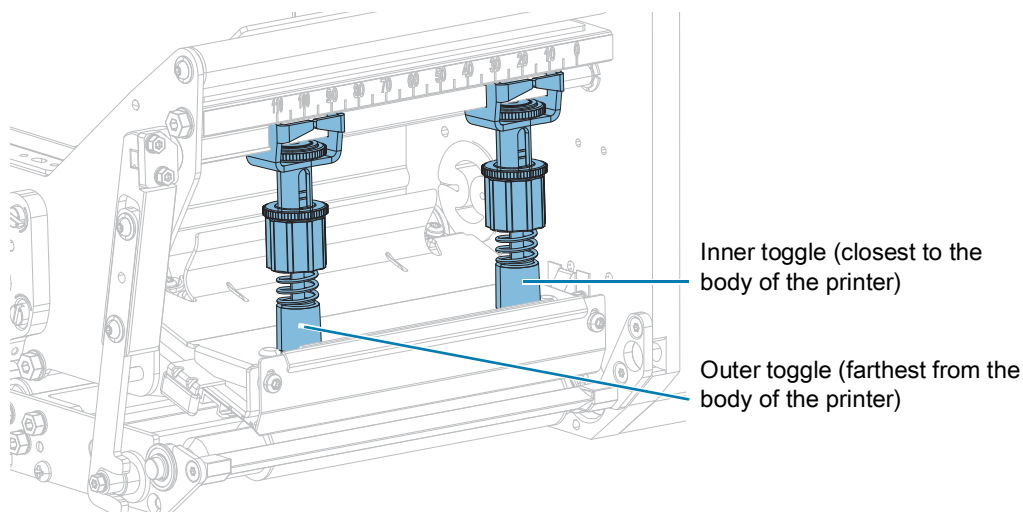


Adjusting the Printhead Pressure

Routine Maintenance

Routine preventive maintenance is a crucial part of normal printer operation. By taking good care of your printer, you can minimize the potential problems that you might have with it and help to achieve and to maintain your standards for print quality.

Over time, the movement of media or ribbon across the printhead wears through the protective ceramic coating, exposing and eventually damaging the print elements (dots). To avoid abrasion:

- Clean the printhead frequently.
- Minimize printhead pressure and burn temperature (darkness) settings by optimizing the balance between the two.
- When using Thermal Transfer mode, ensure that the ribbon is as wide or wider than the media to prevent exposing the printhead elements to the more abrasive label material.



IMPORTANT: Zebra is not responsible for damage caused by the use of cleaning fluids on this print engine.

Cleaning Schedule and Procedures

Specific cleaning procedures are provided in this section. [Table 1](#) shows the recommended cleaning schedule. These intervals are intended as guidelines only. You may have to clean more often, depending upon your application and media.

Cleaning the Exterior, the Media Compartment, and the Sensors

Over time, dust, grime, and other debris may build up on the outside and inside of your printer, particularly in a harsh operating environment.

Printer Exterior

You may clean the exterior surfaces of the print engine with a lint-free cloth and a small amount of a mild detergent, if necessary. Do not use harsh or abrasive cleaning agents or solvents.



IMPORTANT: Zebra is not responsible for damage caused by the use of cleaning fluids on this print engine.

Media Compartment and Sensors

Brush, air blow, or vacuum any accumulated paper lint and dust away from the media and ribbon paths and the sensors.

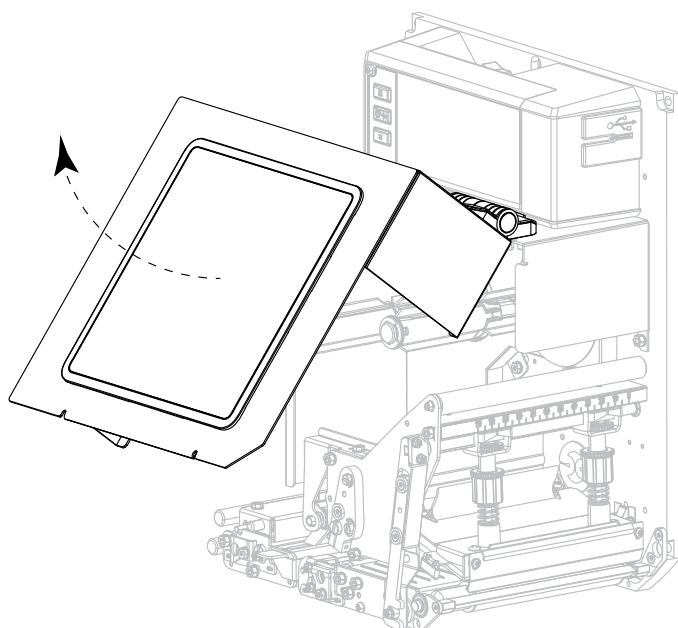
Cleaning the Printhead and Rollers

Inconsistent print quality, such as voids in the barcode or graphics, may indicate a dirty printhead. For the recommended cleaning schedule, see [Cleaning Schedule and Procedures on page 72](#).



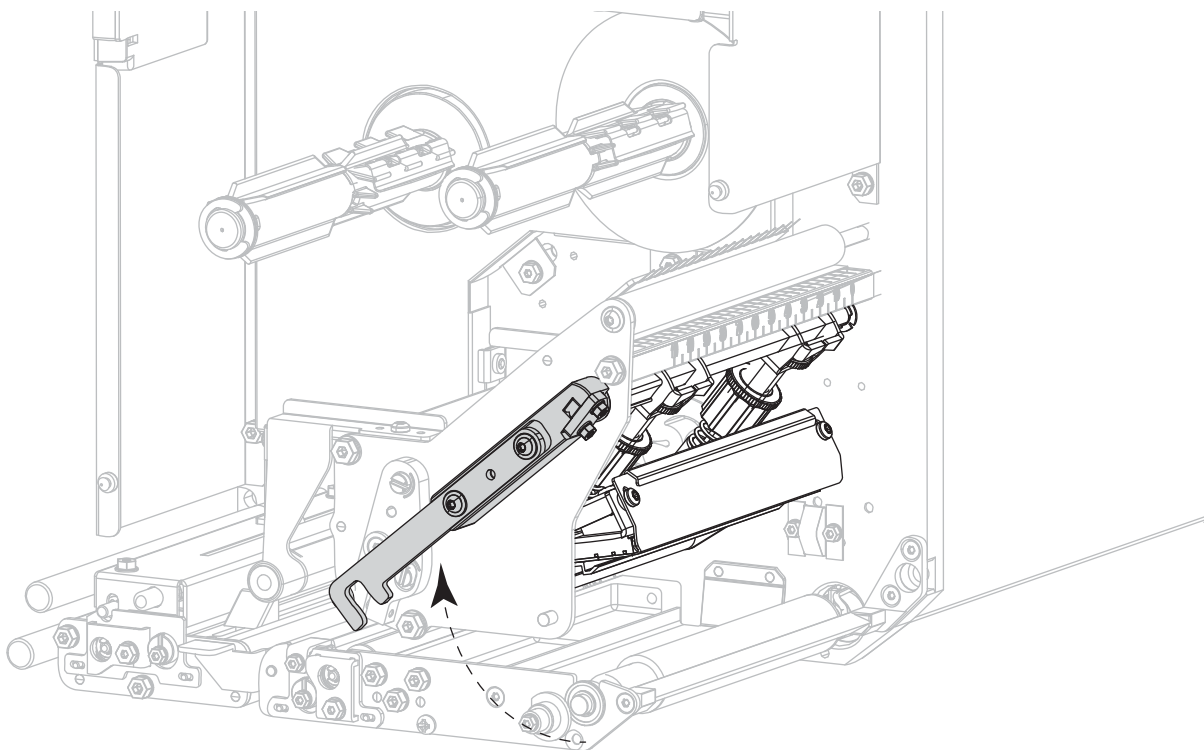

Replacing Print Engine Components

Some print engine components, such as the printhead and platen roller, may wear out over time and can be replaced easily. Regular cleaning may extend the life of some of these components. See [Table 1 on page 72](#) for the recommended cleaning intervals.

Ordering Replacement Parts

Zebra™ printers are designed to work only with genuine Zebra printheads, thus maximizing safety and print quality. Contact your authorized Zebra reseller for part ordering information.

Recycling Print Engine Components



The majority of this print engine's components are recyclable. The print engine's main logic board may include a battery that you should dispose of properly.

Do not dispose of any print engine components in unsorted municipal waste. Please dispose of the battery according to your local regulations, and recycle the other print engine components according to your local standards. For more information, see zebra.com/environment.

Storing the Print Engine

If you are not placing the print engine into immediate operation, repackage it using the original packing materials. You may store the print engine under the following conditions:

- Temperature: -40°C to 60°C (-40° to 140°F)
- Relative humidity: 5% to 85% non-condensing

Lubrication

No lubrication is needed for this print engine.

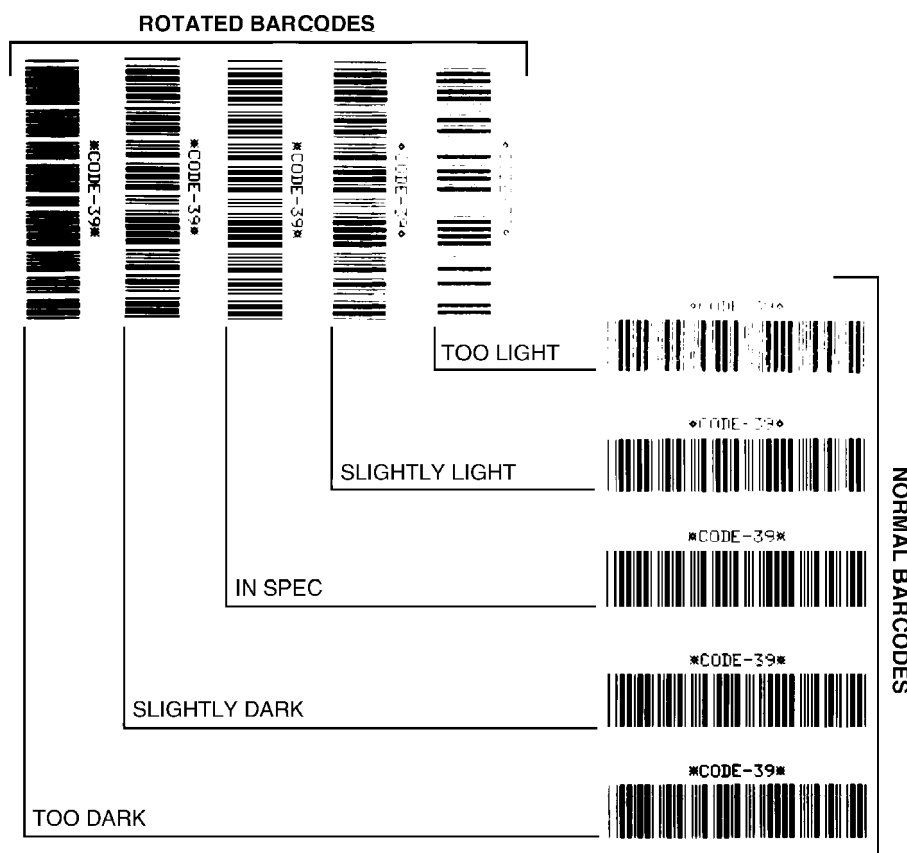
Troubleshooting

This section provides information about errors that you might need to troubleshoot. Assorted diagnostic tests are included.

Judging Barcode Quality

Figure 1 shows how printer settings such as darkness and print speed can affect the quality of barcodes. Set the print darkness to the lowest setting that provides good print quality. The Print Quality Assistant in [Running the Print Wizard and Printing a Test Label on page 27](#) can help you determine the best settings.

Figure 1 Barcode Darkness Comparison



Too Dark

Labels that are too dark are fairly obvious. They may be readable but not in-spec.

- The normal barcode bars increase in size.
- The openings in small alphanumeric characters may fill in with ink.
- Rotated barcode bars and spaces run together.

Slightly Dark

Slightly dark labels are not as obvious.

- The normal barcode will be in-spec.
- Small character alpha numerics will be bold and could be slightly filled in.
- The rotated barcode spaces are small when compared to the in-spec code, possibly making the code unreadable.

In-Spec

A barcode that is “in-spec” (within specifications) can only be confirmed by a verifier, but it should exhibit some visible characteristics.

- The normal barcode will have complete, even bars and clear, distinct spaces.
- The rotated barcode will have complete, even bars and clear, distinct spaces. Although it may not look as good as a slightly dark barcode, the barcode is within specifications.
- In both normal and rotated styles, small alphanumeric characters look complete.

Slightly Light

Slightly light labels are, in some cases, preferred to slightly dark ones for barcodes.

- Both normal and rotated barcodes will be in spec.
- Small alphanumeric characters may not be complete.

Too Light

Labels that are too light are obvious.

- Both normal and rotated barcodes have incomplete bars and spaces.
- Small alphanumeric characters are unreadable.

Configuration Labels

Some of the most commonly used diagnostic items are the printer configuration label and the network configuration label. Sample labels are shown in [Figure 2](#). Analyzing the information on these labels can help you to troubleshoot potential issues.

To print a printer configuration label, touch **Menu > Settings > Print: System Settings**.

To print a network configuration label, touch **Menu > Connection > Networks > Print: Network Info**.

Use this self-test to provide the test labels required when making adjustments to the print engine's mechanical assemblies or to determine if any printhead elements are not working. [Figure 3](#) shows a sample printout.

Figure 3 PAUSE Self-Test Label



1. Turn off (O) the print engine.
2. Press and hold **PAUSE** while turning on (I) the print engine. Hold **PAUSE** until the first control panel light turns off.
 - The initial self-test prints 15 labels at the print engine's slowest speed, and then automatically pauses the print engine. Each time **PAUSE** is pressed, an additional 15 labels print.
 - While the print engine is paused, pressing **CANCEL** alters the self-test. Each time **PAUSE** is pressed, 15 labels print at 152 mm (6 in.) per second.
 - While the print engine is paused, pressing **CANCEL** again alters the self-test a second time. Each time **PAUSE** is pressed, 50 labels print at the print engine's slowest speed
 - While the print engine is paused, pressing **CANCEL** again alters the self-test a third time. Each time **PAUSE** is pressed, 50 labels print at 152 mm (6 in.) per second.
 - While the print engine is paused, pressing **CANCEL** again alters the self-test a fourth time. Each time **PAUSE** is pressed, 15 labels print at the print engine's maximum speed.
3. To exit this self-test at any time, press and hold **CANCEL**.

Printing and Interpreting a Sensor Profile

Touch **Menu > Print > Print Quality > Print: Sensor Profile** to print a sensor profile image (which extends across several actual labels or tags). Use the sensor profile image to troubleshoot the following situations:

- The printer experiences difficulty in determining gaps (web) between labels.
- The printer incorrectly identifies preprinted areas on a label as gaps (web).
- The printer cannot detect ribbon.

Compare your results to the examples shown in this section. If the sensitivity of the sensors must be adjusted, calibrate the printer (see [Calibrating the Ribbon and Media Sensors on page 26](#)).

Media Sensor Profile

The line labeled **MEDIA** (1) on the sensor profile indicates the media sensor readings. The media sensor threshold settings is indicated by **WEB** (2). The media out threshold is indicated by **OUT** (3). The upward or downward spikes (4) indicate divisions between labels (the web, notch, or black mark), and the lines between the spikes (5) indicate where labels are located.

If you compare the sensor profile printout to a length of your media, the spikes should be the same distance apart as the gaps on the media. If the distances are not the same, the print engine may be having difficulty determining where the gaps are located.

Figure 4 Media Sensor Profile (Gap/Notch Media)

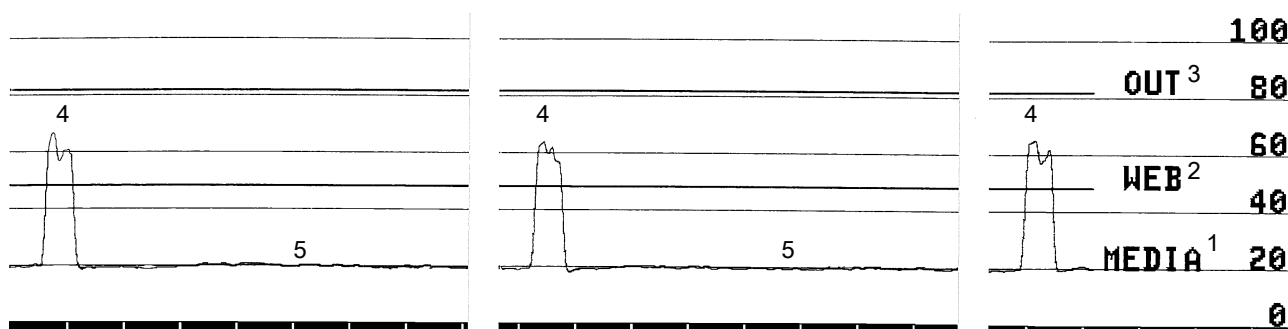
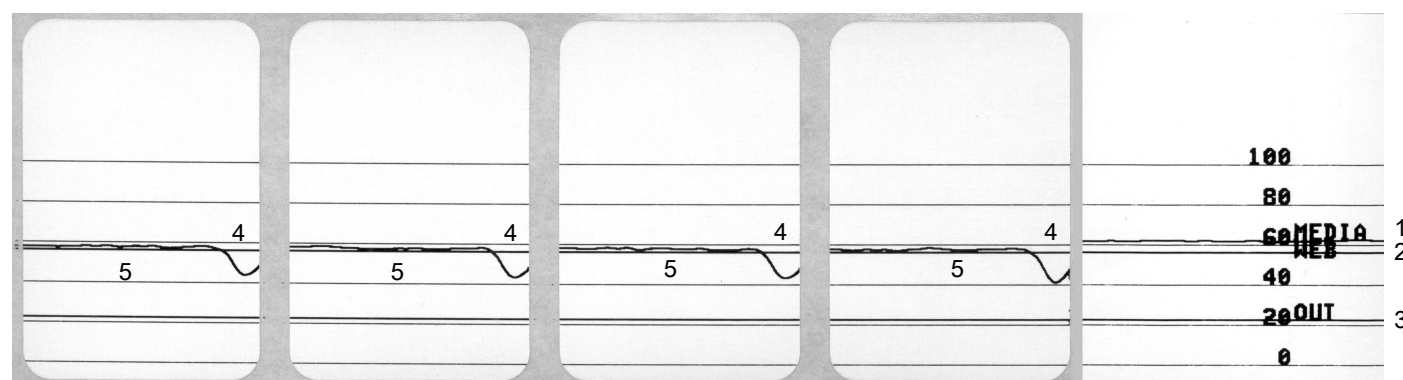
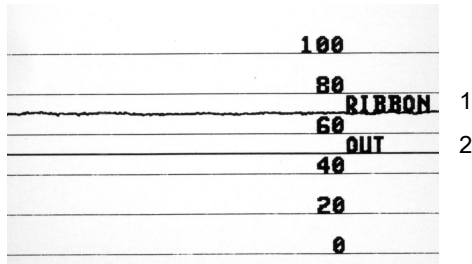


Figure 5 Media Sensor Profile (Black Mark Media)



Ribbon Sensor Profile

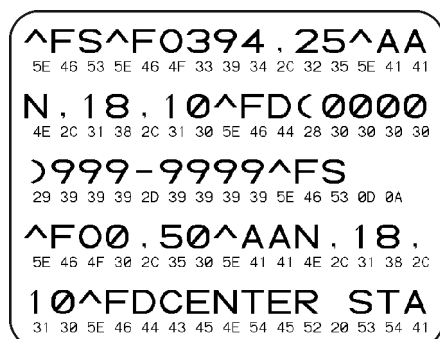
The line labeled **RIBBON** (1) on the sensor profile indicates the ribbon sensor readings. The ribbon sensor threshold setting is indicated by **OUT** (2). If the ribbon readings are below the threshold value, the print engine does not acknowledge that ribbon is loaded.



Using Communication Diagnostics Mode

The communication diagnostics test is a troubleshooting tool for checking the interconnection between the print engine and the host computer. When the printer is in diagnostics mode, it prints all data received from the host computer as straight ASCII characters with the hex values below the ASCII text. The print engine prints all characters received, including control codes such as CR (carriage return). [Figure 6](#) shows a typical test label from this test.

1. Set the label width equal to or less than the actual media width being used for the test. Touch **Settings > Media Settings** to access the label width setting.
2. Touch **Menu > System > Program Language > Diagnostic Mode**, and change the setting to **Print**.
The printer enters diagnostics mode and prints any data received from the host computer on a test label



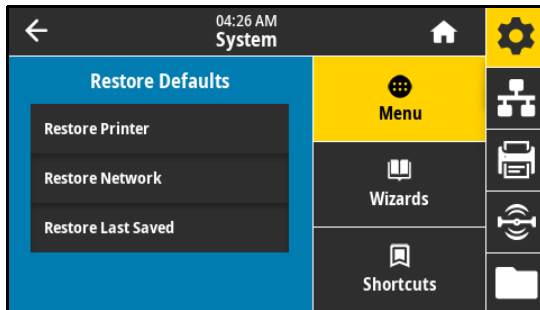
NOTE: Other options for this mode include **E:Drive** for saving the output to the print engine's hard drive and **USB Host** to save the output to a device that is connected to the USB host port.

3. Check the output for error codes. For any errors, check that your communication parameters are correct.
Errors show on the test label as follows:
 - **FE** indicates a framing error.
 - **OE** indicates an overrun error.
 - **PE** indicates a parity error.
 - **NE** indicates noise.
4. To exit this self-test and return to normal operation, power cycle the printer or set the **Diagnostic Mode** option to **Off**.

Loading Defaults or Last Saved Values

Restoring the printer to default values or to the last saved values can help if things are not working as expected. Use care when loading defaults because you will need to reload all settings that you changed manually.

Touch **Menu > System > Settings > Restore Defaults** to see the available options.

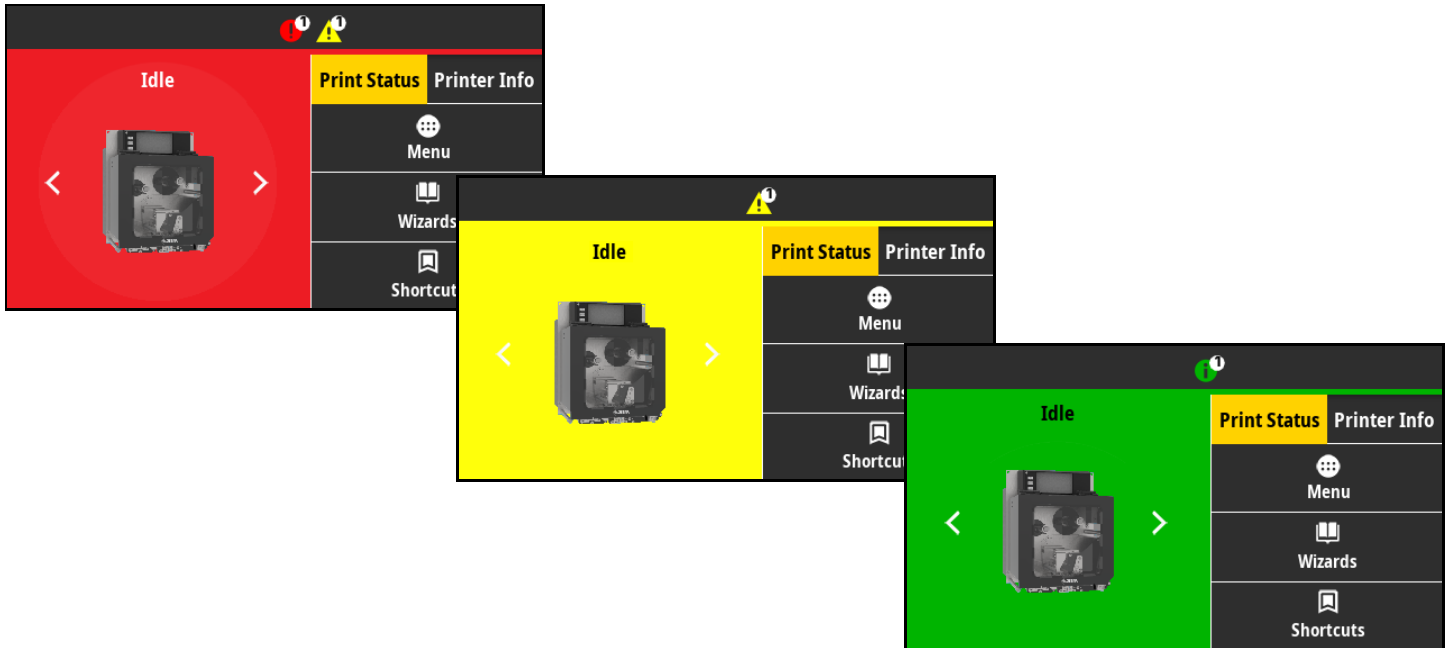


- **Restore Printer**—Restores all printer settings other than the network settings back to the factory defaults.
- **Restore Network**—Reinitializes the printer's wired or wireless print server. With a wireless print server, the printer also reassociates with your wireless network.
- **Restore Last Saved**—Loads settings from the last permanent save.

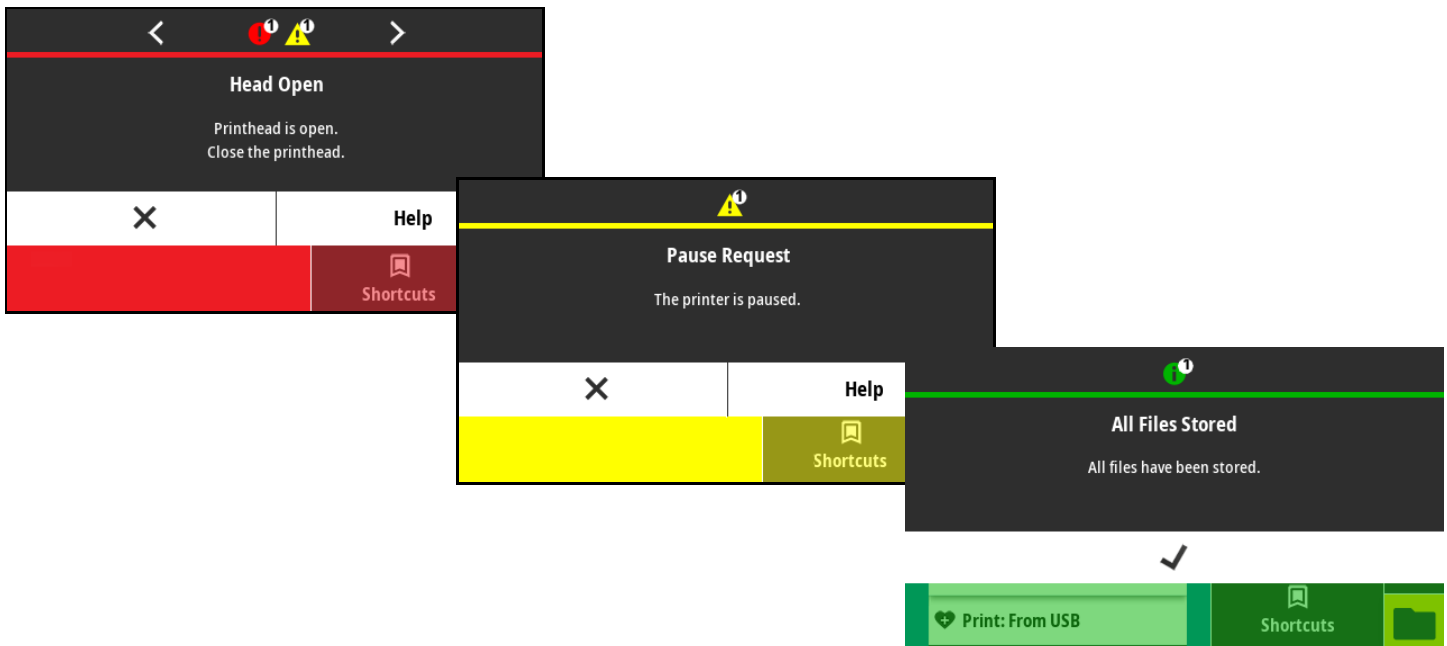

Alert and Error States

If the background color of the Home screen changes, you may need to take an action to restore the printer to a Ready status. Red and yellow backgrounds typically halt printing until the issue is resolved. Informational messages with a green background usually disappear without user intervention, and printing continues as normal.

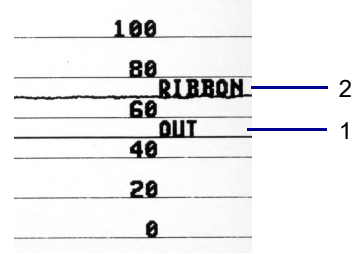

Using USB Host Ports and Print Touch/NFC

This section instructs you how to use a USB host port and how to use the printer's Print Touch feature with an NFC-enabled device (such as a phone or tablet). The information is presented in the form of exercises with some SGD commands listed for advanced users.

USB Host Ports

A USB host port allows you to connect USB devices—such as a keyboard, scanner, or USB Flash drive—to the printer. Your printer is equipped with two USB host ports on the right side of the control panel.

File Naming

File names for use with the USB host ports are restricted to a limited set of ASCII characters.

- Use: ASCII alphanumeric characters (A,a, B, b, C, ... 0, 1, ...), periods, and dashes.
- Do not use: underscores, accented characters, Cyrillic characters, or Asian (CJK) characters,

Print Touch/Near Field Communication (NFC)



The Zebra Print Touch feature allows you to touch an NFC-enabled device (such as a phone or tablet) to the printer's NFC logo to pair the device to the printer. This capability allows you to use your device to provide information for which you are prompted and then print a label using that information.



IMPORTANT: Some devices may not support NFC communication with the printer until you alter their settings. If you encounter difficulties, consult your service provider or your device manufacturer for more information.

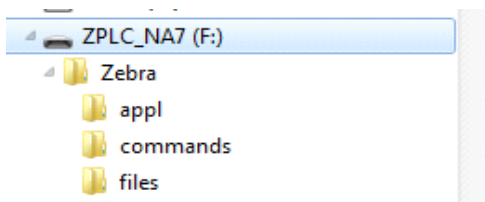

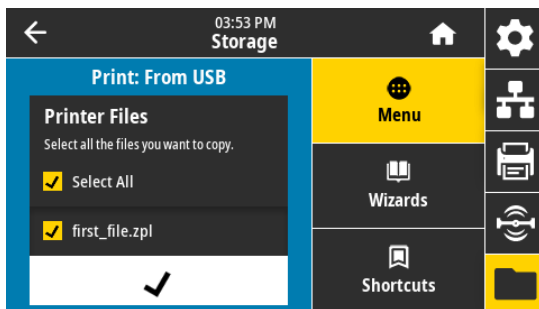

2. Insert the USB Flash drive into a USB host port on the front of your printer.
3. Observe the control panel and wait for the following to happen:
 - a. If the firmware was included the USB Flash drive and that firmware is different than what is on the printer, the firmware downloads to the printer. The printer then restarts and prints a printer configuration label. (If there is no firmware on the USB Flash drive or if the firmware version is the same, the printer skips this action.)
 - b. The printer downloads the files in the /files folder and briefly shows the names of the files that are downloading on the display.
 - c. The printer executes any files in the /commands folder.
 - d. The printer restarts and then displays the message:
MIRROR PROCESSING FINISHED.
4. Remove the USB Flash drive from the printer.

Exercise 2: Printing a Label Format from a USB Flash Drive

The Print From USB option allows you to print files from a USB mass storage device, such as a USB Flash drive. Only printable files (.ZPL and .XML) may be printed from the USB mass storage device, and the files must be located at the root level, not in a directory.

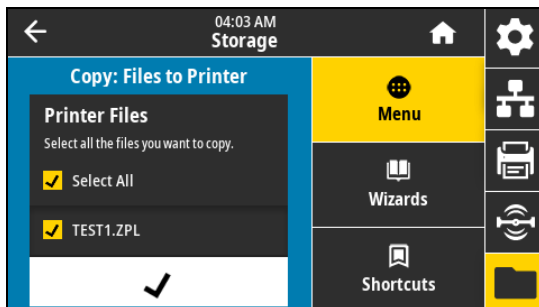

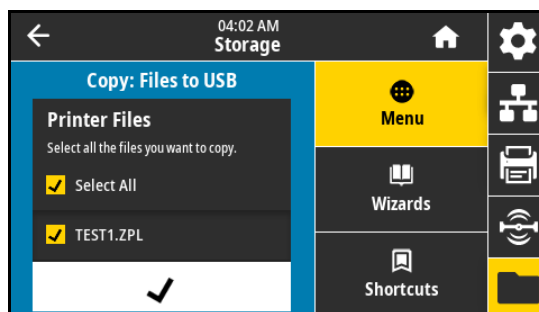

The printer stores the files in E: memory.
7. Remove the USB Flash drive from the USB host port.

You can now copy these files from the printer to a USB Flash drive by touching **Menu > Storage > USB > Copy: Files to USB**.

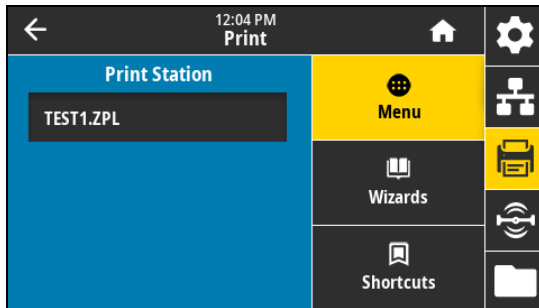


The option **Select All** is available to store all of the available files from the printer to the USB Flash drive. Any .ZPL file that is copied will be post-processed such that the contents of the file will be suitable to be sent to a printer for normal execution.

Exercise 4: Entering Data for a Stored File with a USB Keyboard and Printing a Label

The Print Station feature allows you to use a USB Human Interface Device (HID), such as a keyboard or a barcode scanner, to enter ^FN field data into a *.ZPL template file.

1. After performing the previous exercise, plug a USB keyboard into a USB host port.
2. Touch **Menu > Print > Print Station**.



The printer loads any executable files and processes them. The available files are listed.

3. Select the file `KEYBOARDINPUT.ZPL`.

The printer accesses the file and prompts you for the information in the ^FN fields in the file. In this case, it prompts you for your name.

4. Type your name on the keyboard, and then press **<ENTER>**.

The printer prompts for the number of labels to print.

5. Type the desired quantity of labels, and then press **<ENTER>** again.

The specified number of labels is printed, with your name in the appropriate fields.

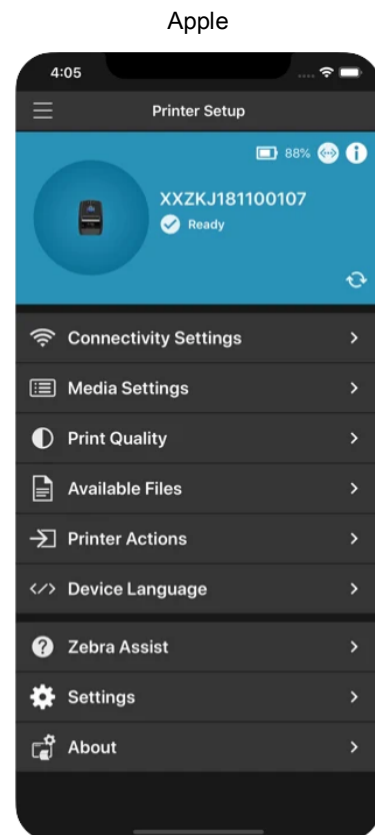
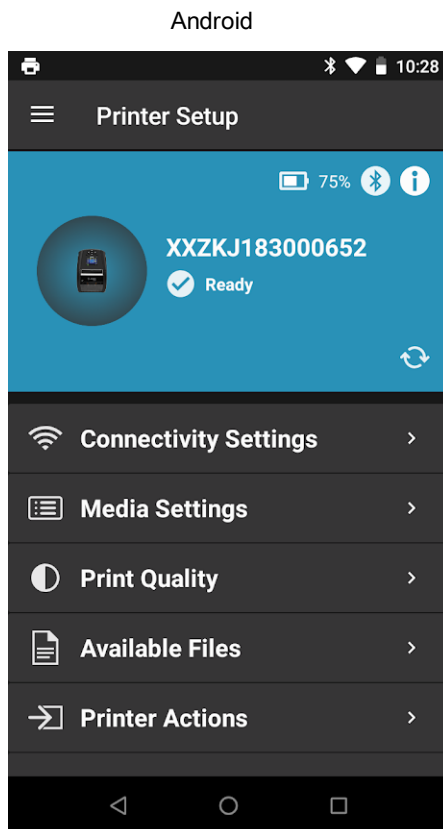

 - c. After your device has been detected by the printer, the printer may prompt you to accept or reject the pairing. If necessary, touch **ACCEPT**. Some devices will pair with the printer without this prompt.

The printer and your device are paired.

3. Start the Zebra Utilities app on your device.

4. Perform this step if you have an Apple device:

- a. Touch the  **Settings** icon.
- b. Change the setting for **Get Labels From Printer** to **ON**.
- c. Touch **Done**.

5. Touch **Available Files**.

The device gets data from the printer and displays it.



NOTE: This retrieval process may take a minute or more to complete.

6. Scroll through the formats shown and select **E : SMARTDEVINPUT.ZPL**.

Based on the ^FN field in the label format, the device prompts you for your name.

7. Enter your name at the prompt.
8. Change the quantity of labels to print, if desired.
9. Touch **Print** to print the label.

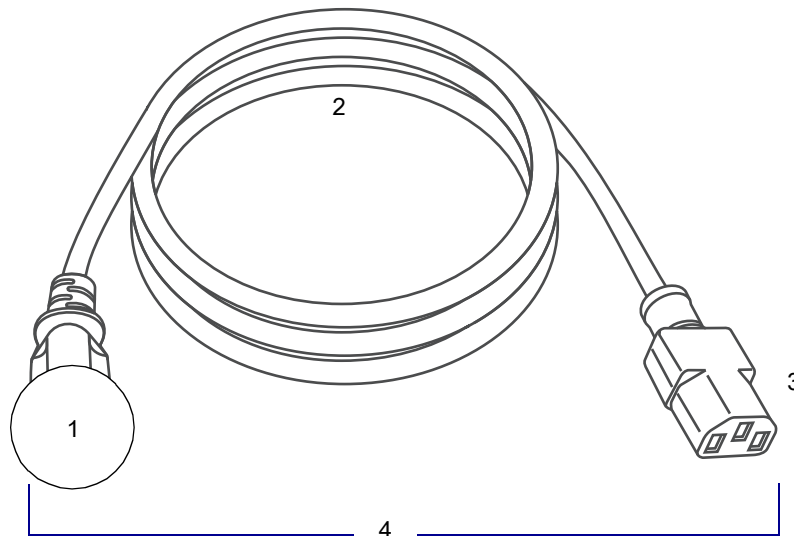

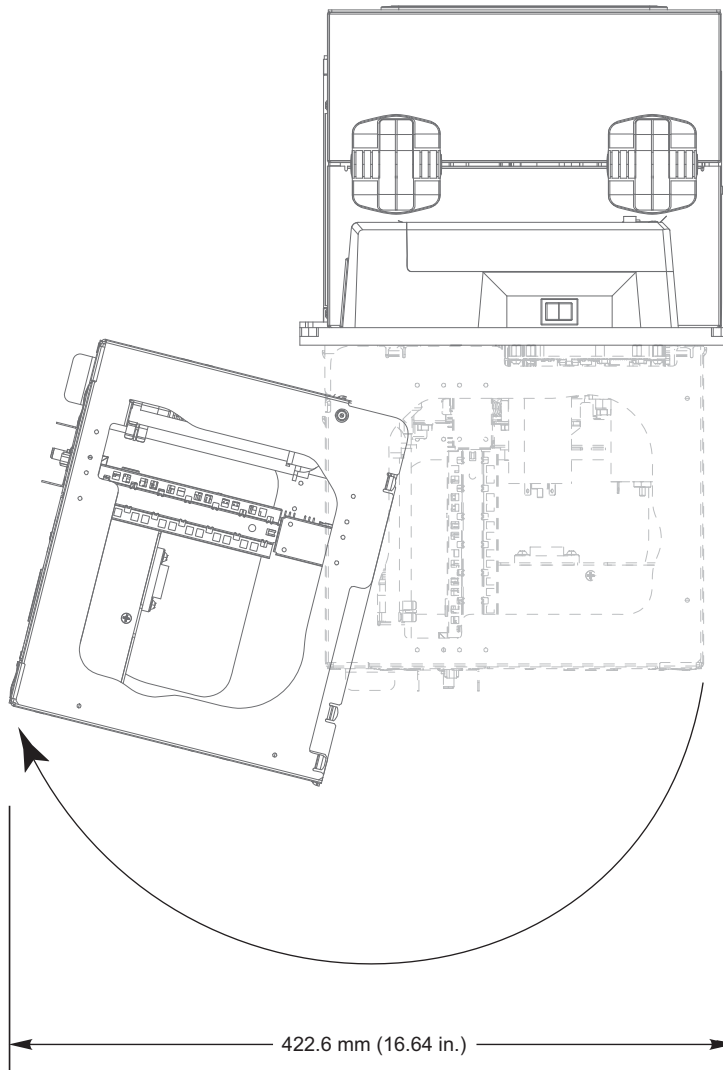
Front View (Right-Hand Print Engine Shown)



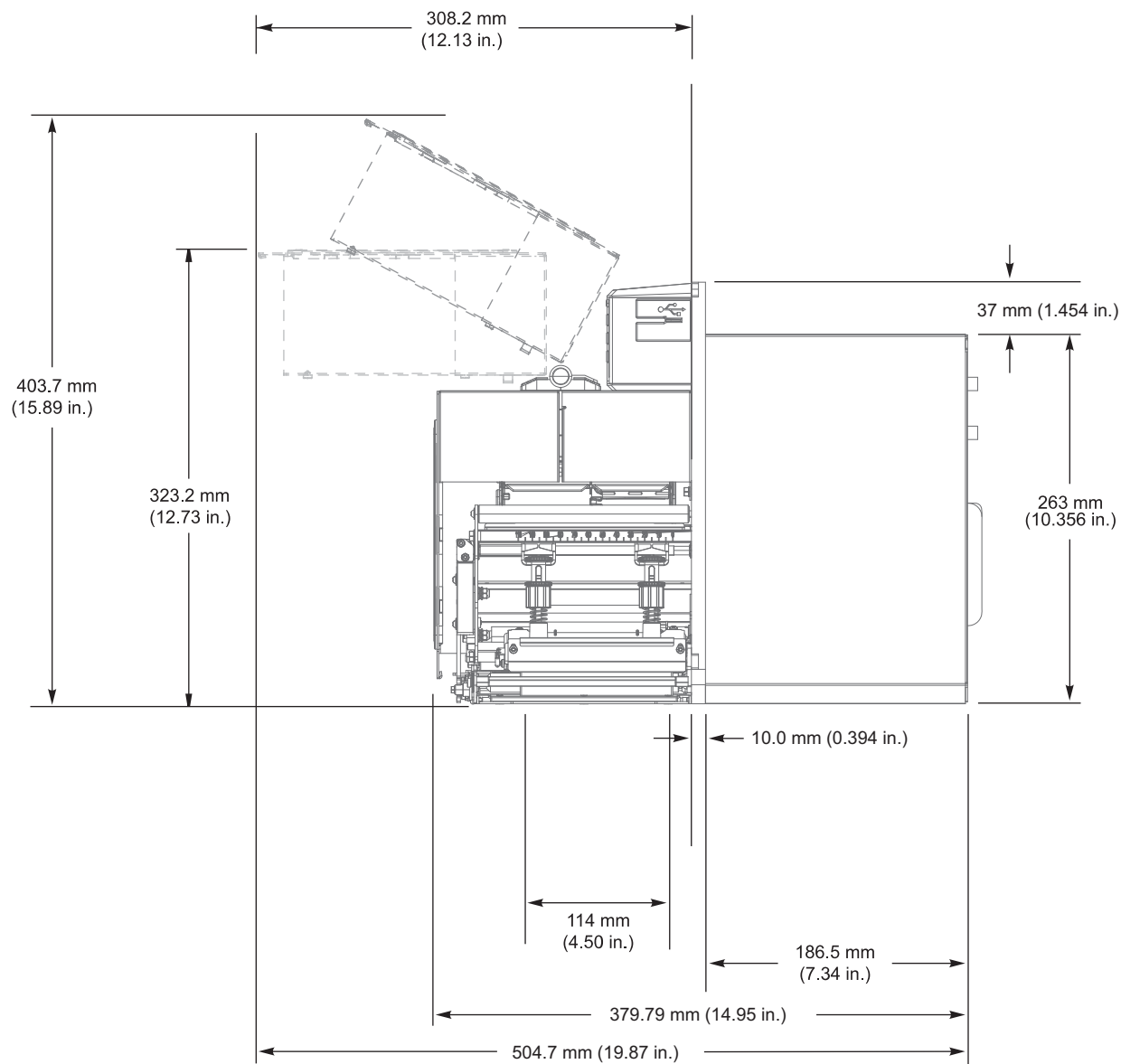

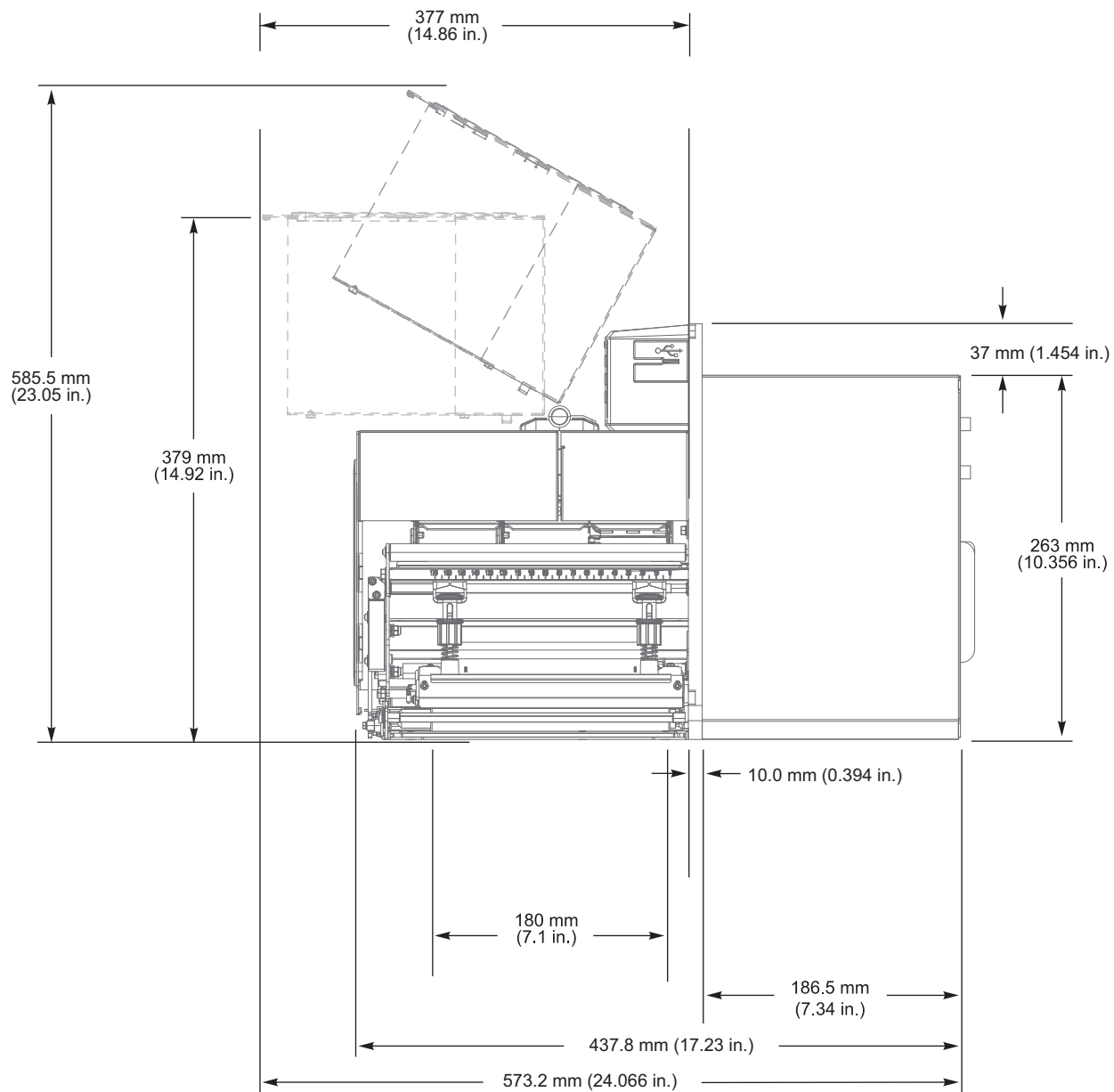
Top View—Electronics Enclosure Clearance

Print Engine Installation

This section provides basic information for mounting the print engine into an applicator.

Requirements

Stability When the print engine is mounted, the complete assembly must be physically stable. When the print engine is loaded with ribbon and media, the equipment must not become physically unstable.

Ventilation and Temperature Provide ventilation for the print engine mounting enclosure to remove heat and ensure uninterrupted, trouble-free operation of the print engine. Ambient air temperature surrounding the print engine must not exceed the following:

- Temperature: 0° to 41°C (32° to 105°F)
- Relative humidity: 20% to 95% non-condensing

Power Requirements Consider the current rating of the print engine during installation. When power is applied to the print engine and the enclosing equipment, an overload condition must not be created.

Grounding Requirements Maintain reliable grounding of the print engine. Pay particular attention to the AC power supply connections so that earth ground is maintained through the AC power input connector.

Clearance for Cables and Connectors Allow ample space at the rear of the print engine for electronic connectors and dressing of the following cables: power cord, serial and/or parallel host communication cable, host communication cable (Ethernet), and the discrete signal (applicator) interface cable. The use of cable strain relief clamps is recommended.

Power Cord Requirements The IEC power cord does not have a strain relief on the print engine. If the operating characteristics of the applicator include vibration or strain on the power cord, provide an appropriate clamping mechanism to avoid unintentional disconnection of the power cord from the print engine.

Inspect the Contents of the Box



IMPORTANT: Zebra Technologies is not responsible for any damage incurred during the shipment of the equipment and will not repair this damage under warranty.

When you receive the print engine, do the following:

1. Immediately unpack the print engine and inspect for shipping damage.
 - Save all packing materials.
 - Check all exterior surfaces for damage.
 - Raise the media cover, and inspect the media compartment for damage to components.
2. If you discover shipping damage upon inspection:
 - Immediately notify the shipping company and file a damage report.
 - Keep all packaging material for shipping company inspection.
 - Notify your authorized Zebra reseller
3. The print engine shipped with several protective items for shipping, including a film of plastic over the transparent window on the media cover. Before operating the print engine, remove these protective items.

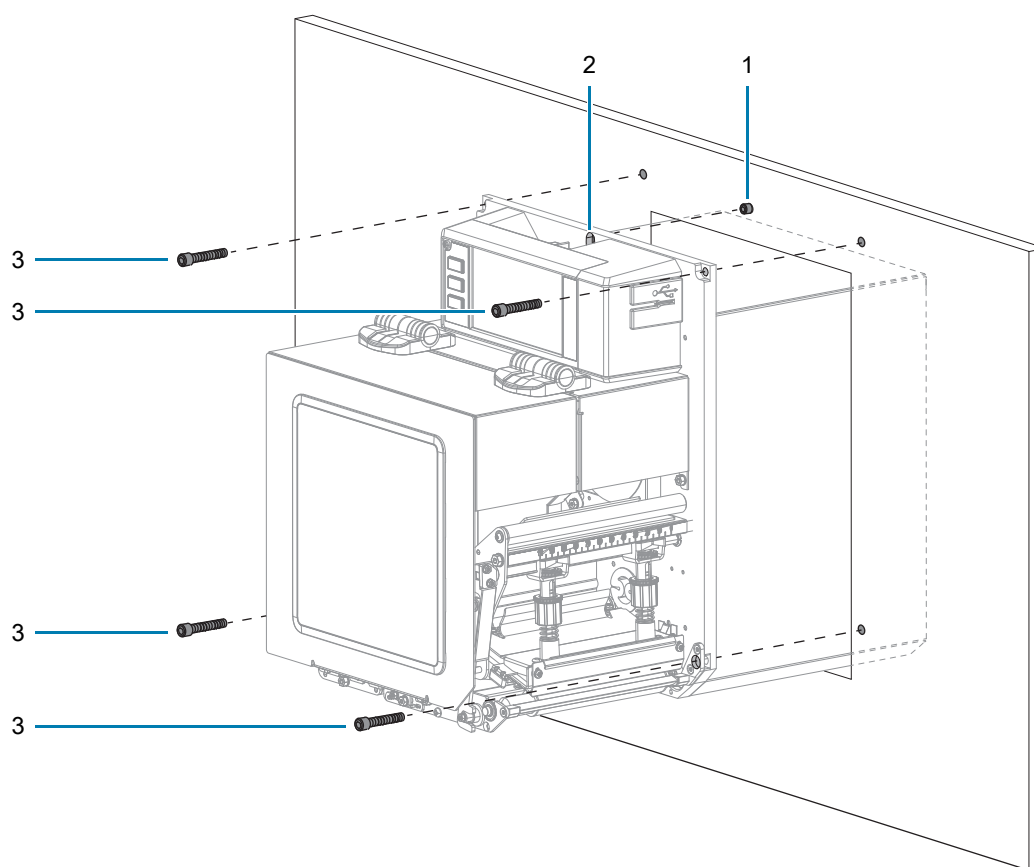
Install the Print Engine in an Applicator

This section provides the basic instructions for installing the print engine into an applicator.



IMPORTANT: A qualified service technician must perform this installation. If the print engine is installed improperly, it could fall out of the applicator and cause injury. The keyhole and the center mounting bolt are designed to support the print engine and assist in installing and removing the four mounting screws.

1. To install the print engine in an applicator:
 - a. Install the center mounting bolt (1) into the center hole on the applicator.
 - b. Carefully place the keyhole (2) on the center mounting bolt.
 - c. Install the four corner mounting screws (4) to secure the print engine to the applicator.

Applicator Interface Board Overview

The applicator interface board provides a robust electrical signal interface between the printer and the outside world via a standard DB15 connector. The applicator **input** signals allow an external device to control when the printer prints. The applicator **output** signals provide handshaking and status information to the external host.

The applicator output voltage can be set to three levels (0V, 5V, 24V) through the Set-Get-Do (SGD) command shown in [Table 3](#). The applicator provides 5V or 24V power to run the I/O interface and to power small external loads. All output signals are open collector with a light pull-up resistor built in. All signals and power are galvanically isolated from the host printer. The applicator provides a jumper to connect printer and applicator grounds, if required, but the default setting is isolation (see [Change the Applicator Interface Board Jumper Configuration on page 139](#)).



IMPORTANT:

- The 0V setting must be used when an external voltage is provided.
- The applicator output power supply can sustain momentary short circuits but may be damaged with long-term shorts. There are no user-replaceable fuses on the applicator interface board.

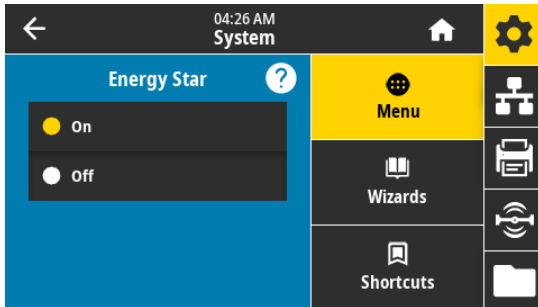

Energy Star Effect on the Applicator Interface Board

6. If necessary, change the voltage using the `device.applicator.voltage` SGD command (see [Table 3 on page 137](#)). Then power cycle the printer.

Figure 9 DB15 Connector

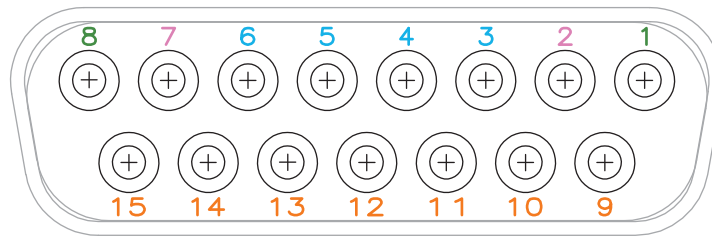


Figure 10 External Pinouts

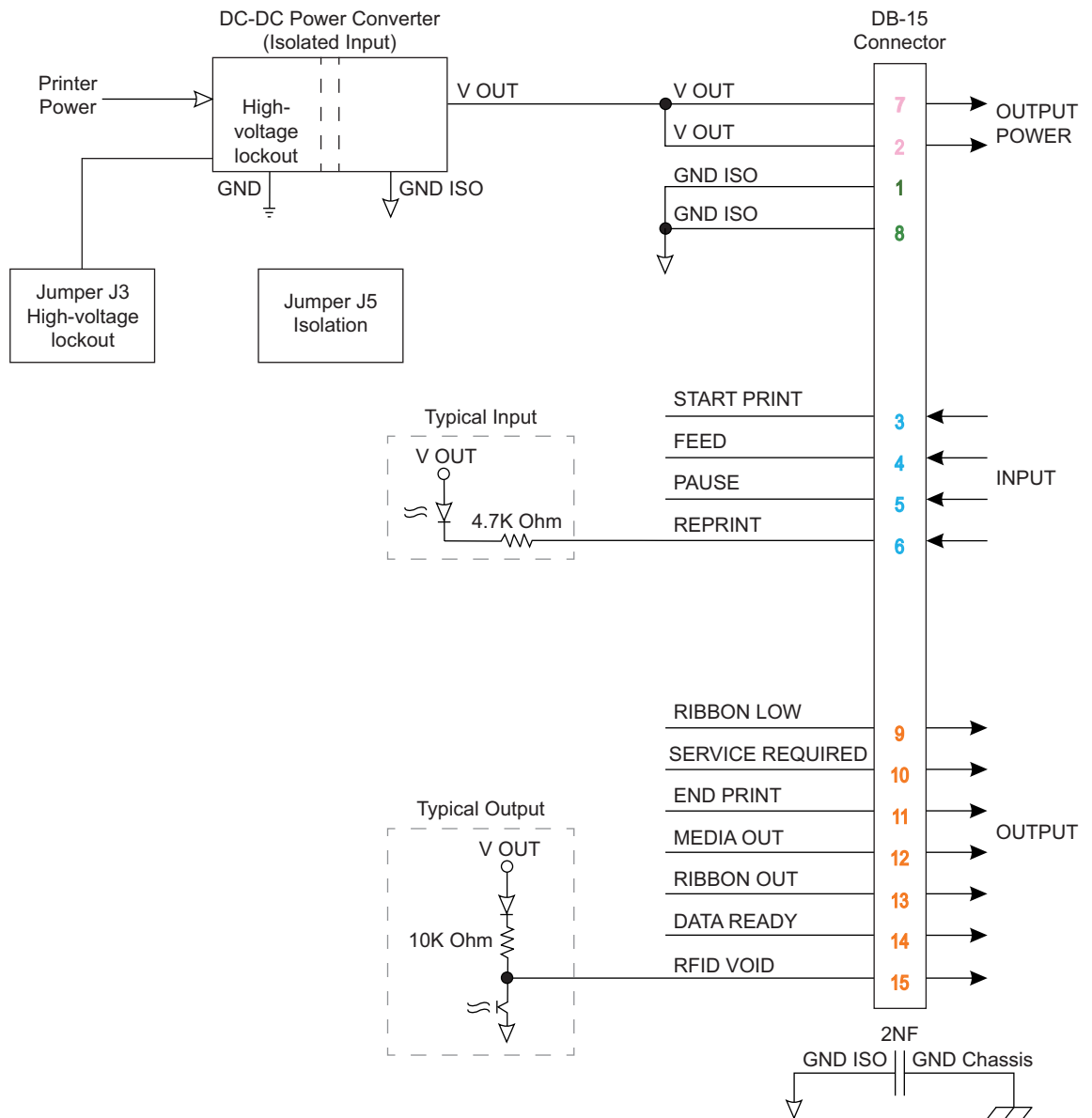

Figure 11 Applicator Signals (Mode 1)

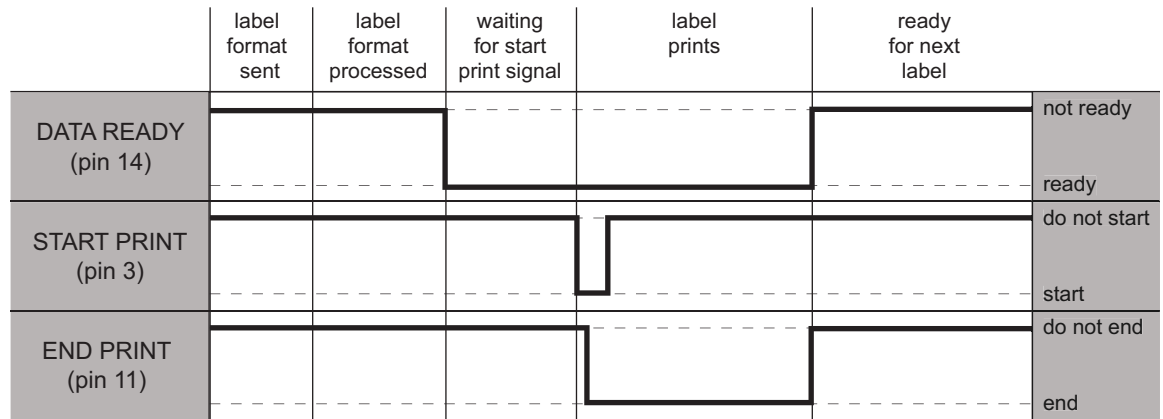


Figure 12 Applicator Signals (Mode 2)

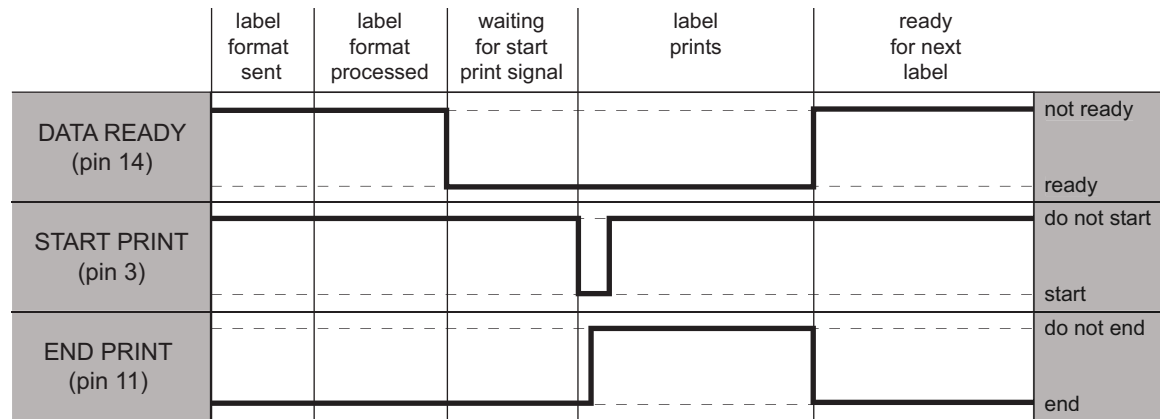


Figure 13 Applicator Signals (Mode 3)

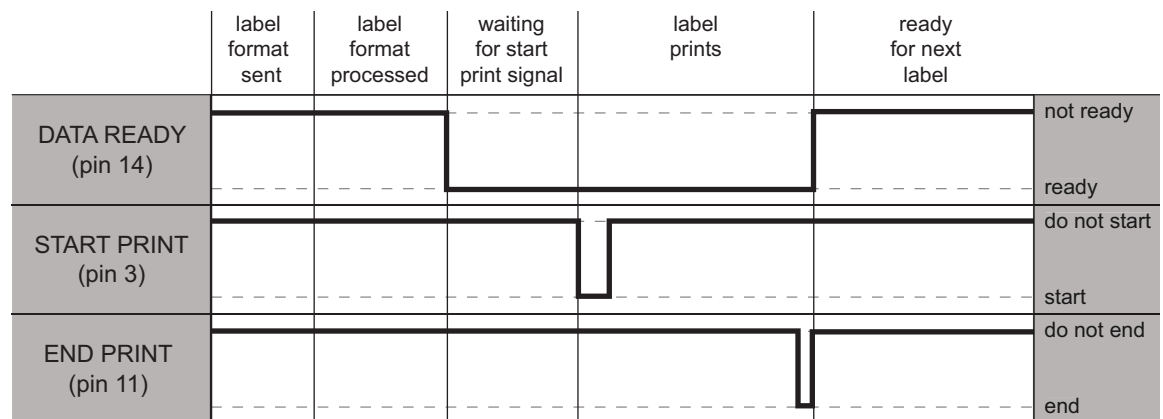
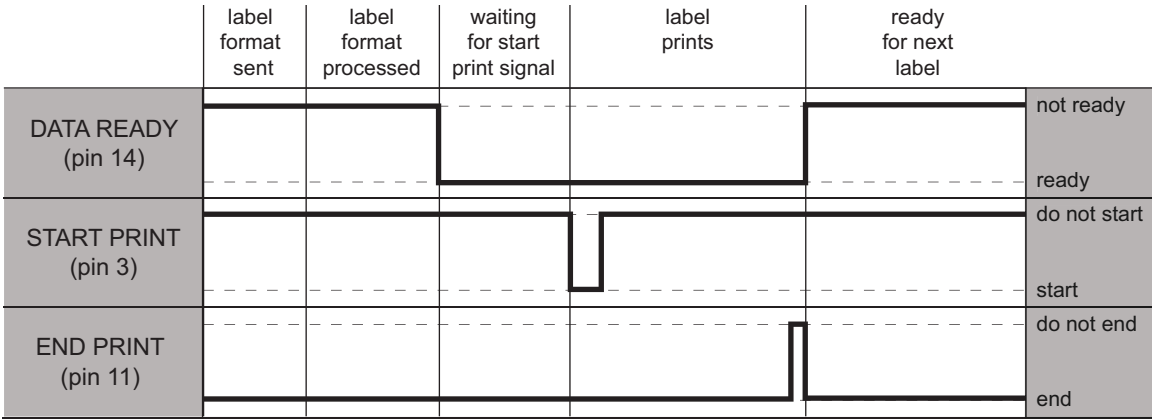


Figure 14 Applicator Signals (Mode 4)

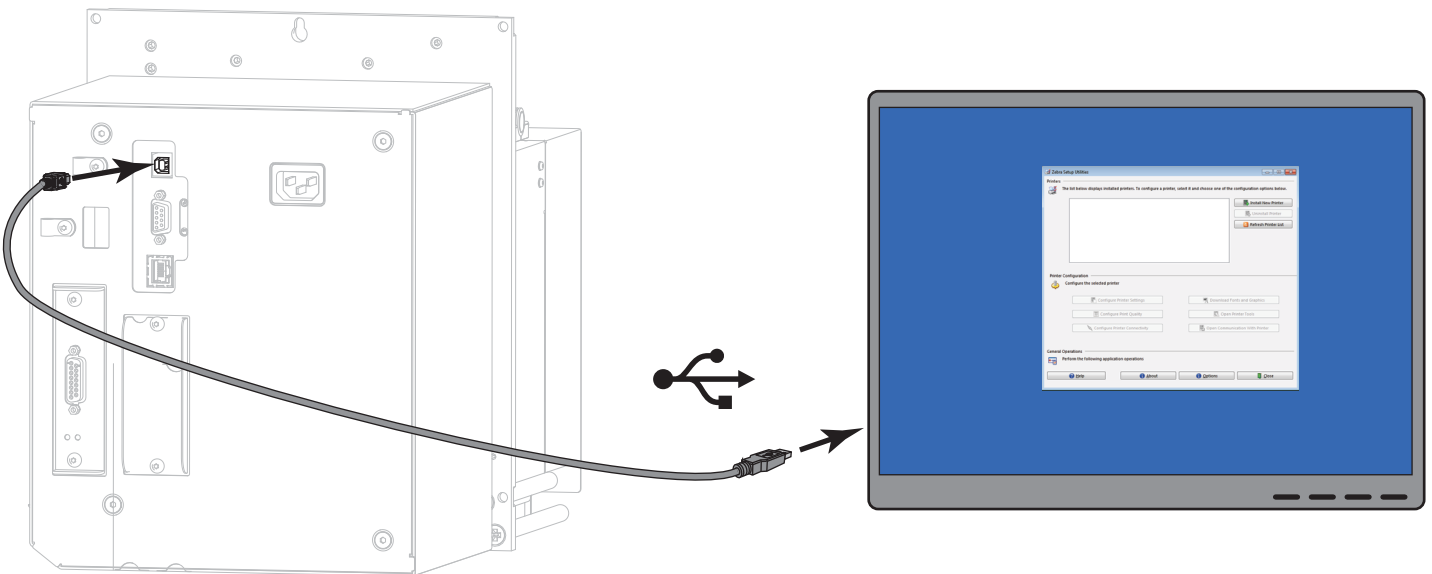

Figure 16 Zebra Setup Utilities Screen

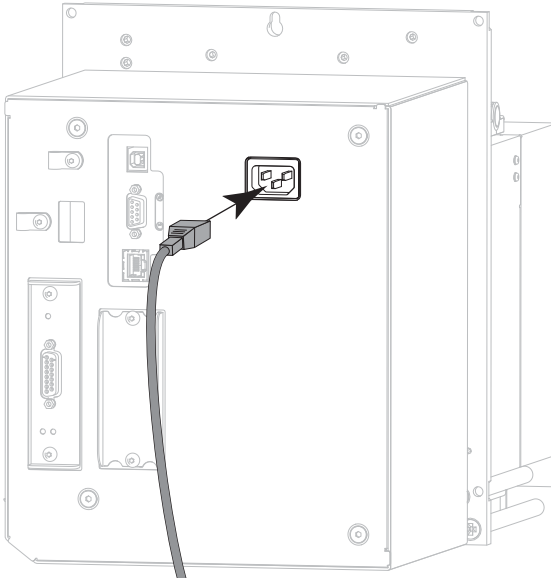

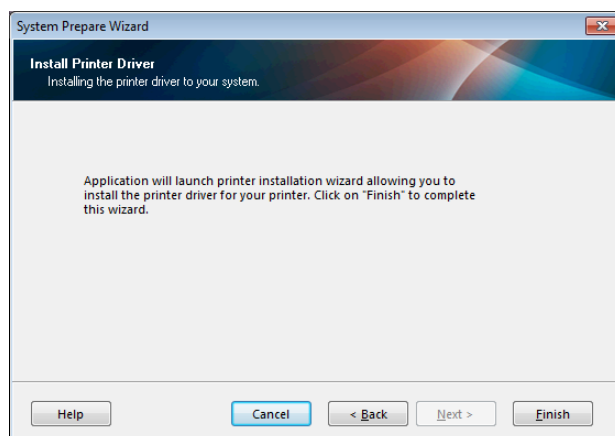

Figure 17 System Prepare Wizard



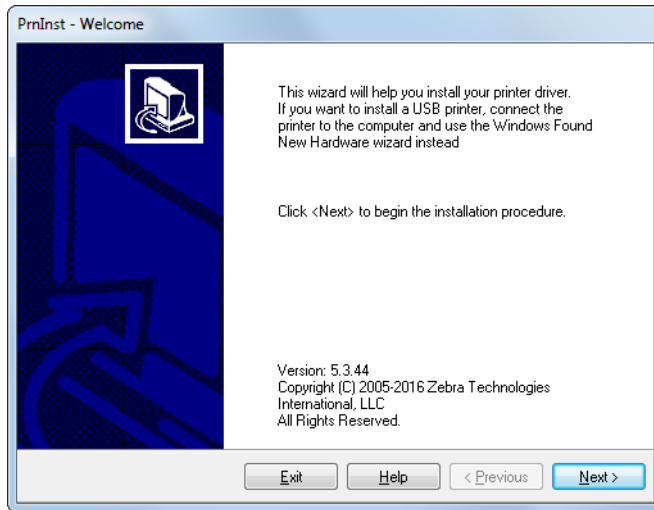

Figure 18 Zebra Setup Utilities Screen

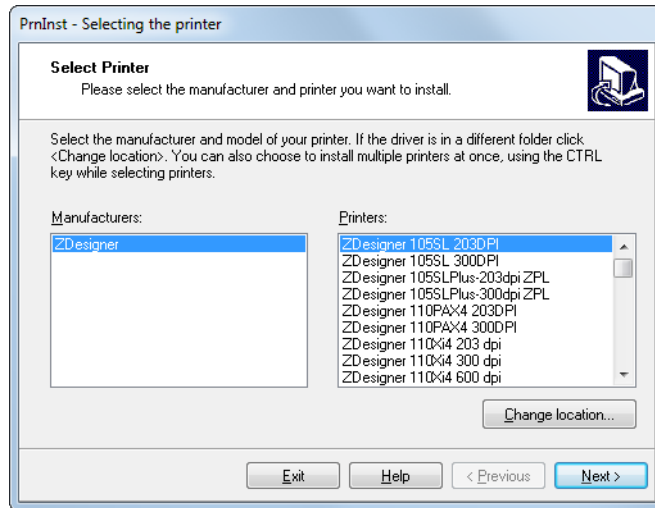

Figure 19 Zebra Setup Utilities Screen



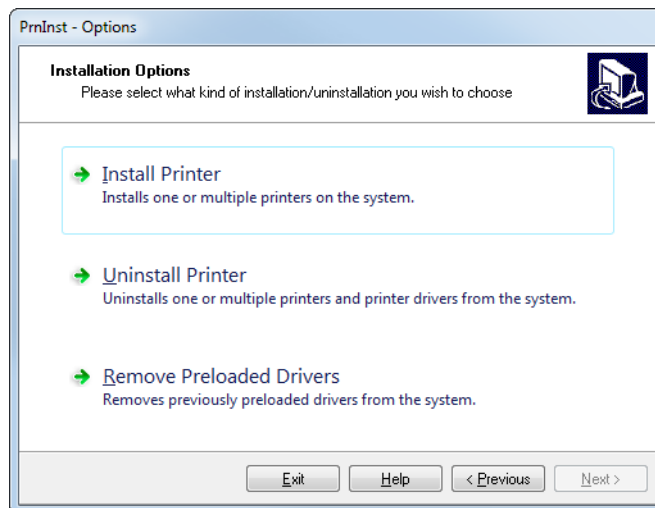

Figure 20 Zebra Setup Utilities Screen

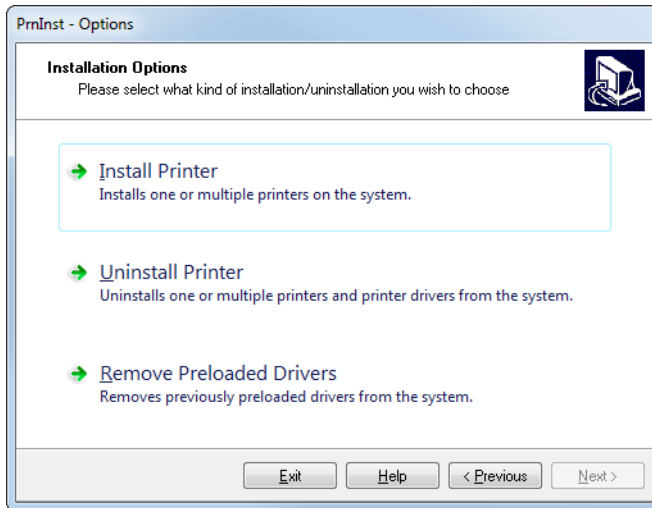

Glossary

alphanumeric Indicating letters, numerals, and characters such as punctuation marks.

backfeed When the printer pulls the media and ribbon (if used) backward into the printer so that the beginning of the label to be printed is properly positioned behind the printhead. Backfeed occurs when operating the printer in Tear-Off and Applicator modes.

barcode A code by which alphanumeric characters can be represented by a series of adjacent stripes of different widths. Many different code schemes exist, such as the universal product code (UPC) or Code 39.



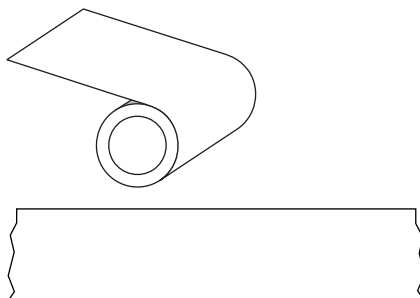
black mark media Media with registration marks found on the underside of the print media that act as start-of-label indications for the printer. The reflective media sensor is typically the best choice for use with black mark media.

Contrast this with [continuous media](#) or [gap/notch media](#).

calibration (of a printer) A process in which the printer determines some basic information needed to print accurately with a particular media and ribbon combination. To do this, the printer feeds some media and ribbon (if used) through the printer and senses whether to use the direct thermal or thermal transfer mode, and (if using non-continuous media) the length of individual labels or tags.

collection method Select a media collection method that is compatible with your printer options. Selections include tear-off, peel-off, cutter, and rewind. The basic media and ribbon loading instructions are the same for all collection methods with some additional steps necessary for using any media collection options.

configuration The printer configuration is a group of operating parameters specific to the printer application. Some parameters are user selectable, while others are dependent on the installed options and mode of operation. Parameters may be switch selectable, control panel programmable, or downloaded as ZPL II commands. A configuration label listing all the current printer parameters may be printed for reference.



continuous media Label or tag-stock media that does not have gaps, holes, notches, or black marks to indicate label separations. The media is one long piece of material wound into a roll. This allows the image to be printed anywhere on the label. Sometimes a cutter is used to cut apart individual labels or receipts.

Contrast this with [black mark media](#) or [gap/notch media](#).

core diameter The inside diameter of the cardboard core at the center of a roll of media or ribbon.

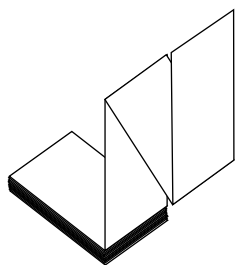
diagnostics Information about which printer functions are not working that is used for troubleshooting printer problems.

die-cut media A type of label stock that has individual labels stuck to a media liner. The labels may be either lined up against each other or separated by a small distance. Typically the material surrounding the labels has been removed. (See [non-continuous media](#).)

direct thermal A printing method in which the printhead presses directly against the media. Heating the printhead elements causes a discoloration of the heat-sensitive coating on the media. By selectively heating the printhead elements as the media moves past, an image is printed onto the media. No ribbon is used with this printing method. Contrast this with [thermal transfer](#).

direct thermal media Media that is coated with a substance that reacts to the application of direct heat from the printhead to produce an image.

dynamic RAM The memory devices used to store the label formats in electronic form while they are being printed. The amount of DRAM memory available in the printer determines the maximum size and number of label formats that can be printed. This is volatile memory that loses the stored information when power is turned off.



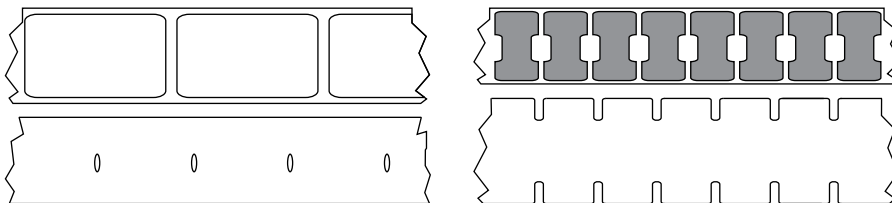
fanfold media Non-continuous media that comes folded in a rectangular stack. Fanfold media is either gap/notch or black mark media. Contrast this with [roll media](#).

firmware This is the term used to specify the printer's operating program. This program is downloaded to the printer from a host computer and stored in FLASH memory. Each time the printer power is turned on, this operating program starts. This program controls when to feed the media forward or backward and when to print a dot on the label stock.

FLASH memory FLASH memory is non-volatile and maintains the stored information intact when power is off. This memory area is used to store the printer's operating program. In addition, this memory can be used to store optional printer fonts, graphic formats, and complete label formats.

Font A complete set of alphanumeric characters in one style of type. Examples include CG Times™, CG Triumvirate Bold Condensed™.

gap/notch media Media that contains a separation, notch, or hole, indicating where one label/printed format ends and the next one begins.



Contrast this with [black mark media](#) or [continuous media](#).

ips (inches-per-second) The speed at which the label or tag is printed. Many Zebra printers can print from 1 ips to 14 ips.

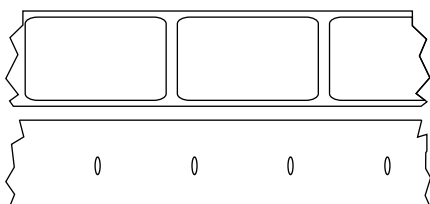
label An adhesive-backed piece of paper, plastic, or other material on which information is printed. A non-continuous label has a defined length, as opposed to a continuous label or a receipt, which can have a varying length.

label backing (liner) The material on which labels are affixed during manufacture and which is discarded or recycled by the end-users.

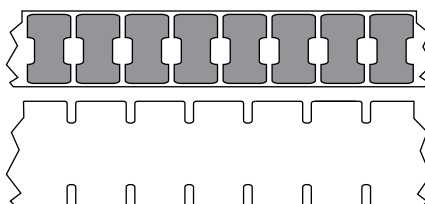
label type The printer recognizes the following label types.

light emitting diode (LED) Indicators of specific printer status conditions. Each LED is either off, on, or blinking depending on the feature being monitored.

linerless media Linerless media does not use backing to keep the layers of labels on a roll from sticking to one another. It is wound like a roll of tape, with the sticky side of one layer in contact with the non-sticky surface of the one below it. Individual labels may be separated by perforations, or they can be cut apart. Because there is no liner, more labels can potentially fit on a roll, cutting down the need to change media as often. Linerless media is considered an environmentally friendly option because no backing is wasted, and the cost per label can be considerably less than that of standard labels.

liquid crystal display (LCD) The LCD is a back-lit display that provides the user with either operating status during normal operation or option menus when configuring the printer to a specific application.

mark media See [black mark media](#).

media Material onto which data is printed by the printer. Types of media include: tag stock, die-cut labels, continuous labels (with and without media liner), non-continuous media, fanfold media, and roll media.

media sensor This sensor is located behind the printhead to detect the presence of media and, for non-continuous media, the position of the web, hole, or notch used to indicate the start of each label.

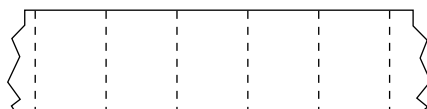
media supply hanger The stationary arm that supports the media roll.

non-continuous media Media that contains an indication of where one label/printed format ends and the next one begins. Gap/notch media and black mark media are types of non-continuous media. Contrast this with [continuous media](#).

non-volatile memory Electronic memory that retains data even when the power to the printer is turned off.

notched media A type of tag stock containing a cutout area that can be sensed as a start-of-label indicator by the printer. This is typically a heavier, cardboard-like material that is either cut or torn away from the next tag. See [gap/notch media](#).

peel-off A mode of operation in which the printer peels a printed label away from the backing and allows the user to remove it before another label is printed. Printing pauses until the label is removed.



perforated media Media with perforations that allow the labels or tags to be separated from each other easily. The media may also have black marks or other separations between labels or tags.

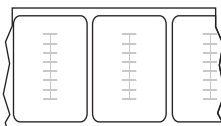
print type The print type specifies whether the type of media being used requires ribbon to print. Thermal Transfer media requires ribbon while Direct Thermal media does not.

print speed The speed at which printing occurs. For thermal transfer printers, this speed is expressed in terms of ips (inches per second).

printhead wear The degradation of the surface of the printhead and/or the print elements over time. Heat and abrasion can cause printhead wear. Therefore, to maximize the life of the printhead, use the lowest print darkness setting (sometimes called burn temperature or head temperature) and the lowest printhead pressure necessary to produce good print quality. In the thermal transfer printing method, use ribbon that is as wide or wider than the media to protect the printhead from the rough media surface.

receipt A receipt is a variable length printout. One example of a receipt is in retail stores, where each purchased item occupies a separate line on the printout. Therefore, the more items purchased, the longer the receipt.

registration Alignment of printing with respect to the top (vertical) or sides (horizontal) of a label or tag.



Radio frequency identification (RFID) media

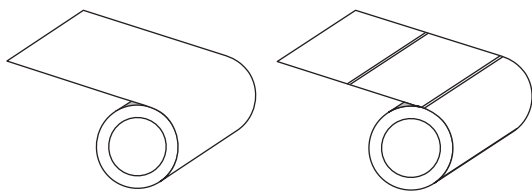
Each RFID label has an RFID transponder (sometimes called an “inlay”), made of a chip and an antenna, embedded between the label and the liner. The shape of the transponder varies by manufacturer and is visible through the label. All RFID labels have memory that can be read, and many have memory that can be encoded.

RFID media can be used in a printer that is equipped with an RFID reader/encoder. RFID labels are made from the same materials and adhesives as non-RFID labels.

ribbon Ribbon is a thin film that is coated on one side with wax, resin, or wax resin (usually called “ink”), which is transferred to the media during the thermal transfer process. Ink is transferred onto the media when heated by the small elements within the printhead.

Ribbon is only used with the thermal transfer mode. Direct thermal media does not use ribbon. When ribbon is used, it must be as wide as or wider than the media being used. If the ribbon is narrower than the media, areas of the printhead are unprotected and subject to premature wear. Zebra ribbons have a coating on the back that protects the printhead from wear.

ribbon wrinkle A wrinkling of the ribbon caused by improper alignment or improper printhead pressure. This wrinkle can cause voids in the print and/or the used ribbon to rewind unevenly. This condition should be corrected by performing adjustment procedures.



roll media Media that comes supplied rolled onto a core (usually cardboard). It can be continuous (no separations between labels) or non-continuous (some type of separation between labels).

Contrast this with [fanfold media](#).

supplies A general term for media and ribbon.

symbology The term generally used when referring to a barcode.

tag stock A type of media having no adhesive backing but featuring a hole or notch by which the tag can be hung on something. Tags are usually made of cardboard or other durable material and are typically perforated between tags. Tag stock can come on rolls or in a fanfold stack. See [gap/notch media](#).

tear-off A mode of operation in which the user tears the label or tag stock away from the remaining media by hand.

thermal transfer A printing method in which the printhead presses an ink or resin coated ribbon against the media. Heating the printhead elements causes the ink or resin to transfer onto the media. By selectively heating the printhead elements as the media and ribbon move past, an image is printed onto the media. Contrast this with [direct thermal](#).

void A space on which printing should have occurred, but did not due to an error condition such as wrinkled ribbon or faulty print elements. A void can cause a printed barcode symbol to be read incorrectly or not at all.
